Dennis was a veterinarian in Marshalltown and Heidi was also involved in the animal industry, but is currently working with Allegiant Airlines as a charter rep. The Dragers spoke to our club about new focuses, including mental health and helping aid in homelessness.

Recently, the Mental Health Initiative: Rotary Action Group was started. This group is a District Chapter of a Global Group and its mission is: to create and provide opportunities for all Rotarians in our District to improve their mental, emotional, and behavioral health in order to lead a healthy, happy, and productive life, to provide support for clubs in the implementation of mental health projects and initiatives in our district and beyond, and to provide a variety of helpful mental health resources in our District that result in a measurable impact on the mental wellness of our club members and our communities. Additionally, the Dragers talked about supporting Jappa House, which is a homeless resource that aids in providing help and resources to homeless individuals. Jappa helps without judgment. 

LITERACY MOMENTS

Continuing on the path of growing our reader, we move to our school-age children. Reading for fun without being forced to do so is an indicator of reading success. A reader needs to be able to choose their own "right" book at the "right" time. It may be nonfiction, fiction, historical fiction, and/or graphic novels. It may be on a device, online or a physical book. Just like you, being able to choose the right book for yourself is one of the most important choices. They should not only see themselves in the books they are reading, but also see what is outside their community and world is like.

Did you know: (following are statistics and research findings worth sharing)

Research shows:

- Childcare quality has a long-term effect on children's cognitive and socioemotional development through kindergarten and beyond.
- The number of books in the home correlates significantly with higher reading scores for children.
 - 61% of low-income families have no books at all in their homes for their children. Children from lowerincome homes have limited access to books. Because of this, there are fewer home and preschool language and literacy opportunities for preschoolers from lowincome families than for children from economically advantaged backgrounds
 - In middle-income neighborhoods, the ratio of books per child is 13 to 1; in low-income neighborhoods, the ratio is 1 age-appropriate book for every 300 children.
- Nationally, only 35% of public school students were at or above proficient in grade 4 reading.
- One in six children who are not reading proficiently in the third grade do not graduate from high school on time, a rate four times greater than that for proficient readers. (rate is higher in children from low-income families and rural areas)
- According to the Department of Education, the more students read or are read to for fun on their own time and at home, the higher their reading scores, generally.

What we can do as Rotarians:

Find ways to give books out in the community. Community events like Trunk or Treat, parades, festivals, library events, and school functions are all opportunities to give books to school-age children.

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
