Stephanie Acri has served as Mayor of Moline for about a year, after serving on the City Council for six years. Since her election, a new City Administrator, as well as new Police and Fire Chiefs, are in place.

Infrastructure is a main focus for the Mayor and Staff. With 360 miles of roads and streets in the City, the goal is to sustain the condition. This requires a solid working relationship with the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) for much of that mileage. Mayor Acri stated that IDOT is a wonderful organization and great to work with.

John Deere Road is the busiest road in the Quad Cities. And, of course, the I-74 bridge project is in the forefront of activity.

Renew Moline focuses on development and redevelopment in Downtown Moline. One of the landmarks is the John Deere Commons, which is celebrating 21 years of existence. The Moline Foundation works hand-in-hand with Renew

Moline to accomplish development throughout the city.

Rotary.org wins Webby People's Voice Award

The people have spoken. With a majority of internet user votes, Rotary.org won the prestigious Webby People's Voice Award for best association website. The International Academy of Digital Arts and Sciences announced the winners on 24 April.

Rotary International's revamped website has been chosen by the International Academy of Digital Arts and Sciences as one of the best association websites in the world.

This year, internet users cast over 3 million votes worldwide. And with over 13,000 entries from nearly all 50 U.S. states and more than 70 countries, this year's contest is the biggest Webby Awards ever. Winners will be recognized at the Webby Awards' 22nd annual ceremony 14 May in New York, New York.

The Webby Awards are the leading international honor for excellence on the internet. Rotary was one of five websites nominated in the best association category. The other nominees were the Paso Robles Wine Country Alliance, 11th Macau Design Biennial, Trade Works for Us, and the Center for Court Innovation.

Rotary was also nominated for a Webby Award whose winner is chosen by the academy. That award went to the Macau Design Biennial.

Former First Lady Laura Bush to speak at Rotary convention

Former First Lady of the United States Laura Bush, an advocate for literacy, education, and women's rights, will speak at the 2018 Rotary Convention in Toronto this June.

For decades Mrs. Bush has fought for key national and global issues including launching groundbreaking education and healthcare programs in the U.S. and abroad. She founded both the Texas Book Festival and the National Book Festival in Washington D.C. As chair of the Women's Initiative at the George W. Bush Institute,

Mrs. Bush continues her work on global healthcare innovations, empowering women in emerging democracies, education reform, and supporting men and women who have served in the U.S. military.

Women's healthcare also has been a central issue for Mrs. Bush. Because heart disease is the leading cause of death among American women, she partnered with the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute to launch The Heart Truth campaign and Red Dress project. The Heart Truth raises awareness among women about their risk for heart disease.

Mrs. Bush is the author of the bestselling memoir, Spoken From the Heart, and bestselling children's book, Our Great Big Backyard. She serves on several boards including the National Advisory Board for the Salvation Army, the Council for the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture, the Board of Trustees for the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and the Southern Methodist University Board of Trustees.
