Dr. Spelhaug – Pleasant Valley School District



Dr. Spelhaug is a familiar face to our Rotary Club, with occasional district updates and supporting Rotary programs. His opening comment was "You can't have great schools without a great community" ... lauding our community for its support of our strong and vital schools.

For a number of years district student growth has been attributed to open enrollment. Actually, there is as much enrolling out of the district as enrolling in. Growth in the PV Schools is coming from the elementary school population, which is sparking some building addition and remodeling projects.

Cody Elementary School is adding classroom space to increase its capacity from a 2-unit school 3-unit. A new

Forest Grove Elementary School is also planned in the Forest Grove Road extension, to serve as a school and activity campus, with parking and tennis courts shared with the Great Lawn Development.

The High School (1,600 enrollment) is also reorganizing space to replace activity space (cafeteria, gymnasium,

performing venues), while locating new classrooms to the newly created activities spaces, and expansion of administrative offices.

Of course a natural current subject is school safety. Dr. Spelhaug stated that the Pleasant Valley School District is opposed to arming teachers ... stating that the teachers are educated and experienced as teaching and inspiring their students ... not as soldiers ... security must be addressed by law-enforcement officials, who are trained in the broad aspects of protection ... as well as the subtleties.

He offered the following insights:

- It is the wrong attitude to say "It will never happen here." We have learned that no one knows where and when it could happen again.
- Every student needs to feel connected and part of the "school family" ... Inclusive encouragement.
- Everyone is the eyes and ears ... the safety net ... anything suspicious should be reported to a school official ... it WILL be taken seriously and checked out.

Thank you to the community for keeping the additional sales tax option alive. This is a source for preventative safely infrastructure to happen, as well as training.
