

Jake Klipsch (Mid-City High School)



Jake Klipsch has been the Principal at Mid-City High School since it opened four years ago. The high school at the intersection of Kimberly Road and Marquette Streets evolved most recently from the Davenport

Community Schools Kimberly Center from a \$5 million grant initiative. The building is a major renovation of a former hospital.

For several years students were placed in the school because of struggles that would hamper their attendance at any of the other Davenport high schools. The model has now changed. Presently, students may choose to attend Mid-City High School.

All students who attend must apply and interview to be accepted into this great school. Most of the 280 to 290 students have issues related to mental health, anxiety, trauma, are victims of bullying or in need of academic help.

One of the goals of the Davenport Community School District is to decrease the drop-out rate. Mid-City High School addresses this goal by way of our Reengagement Center. This center provides a place for students to work on APEX, an online learning program that provides an opportunity for credit recovery. The Reengagement Center is staffed from 7:30-4:00.

One of the things that makes Mid-City an amazing school is some of our unique course offerings, referred to as "Dream" classes. These classes are provided in addition to the traditional course offerings and requirements at Davenport's traditional high schools. These include the following:

- Crime Scene Investigation
- Anime
- Sports Statistics
- Popular Music and Its Impact on Society
- Urban Gardening

A major focus is on relationships and acceptance. These goals are achieved by smaller class size (less than 16), and the students are greeted by name every day by administration. Glass walls between classroom and collaborative seating/gathering spaces create an open inviting atmosphere. Buddy benches help shy and bullied students to encourage other students to spend time with them. Awards are also presented to the Student of the Month.

Part of the large open property is developed by a garden, where students grow potatoes, wheat, Kale and other crops. Another site feature is a large patio where students and staff gather. Mid-City High partners with Grandview Baptist Church for social programs. Daycare is available on site.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL TRIVIA

- Rotary became bilingual in 1916 when the first club was organized in a non-English--speaking country--Havana, Cuba.
- 2. Rotary established the "Endowment Fund" in 1917, which became the forerunner of The Rotary Foundation.
- Rotary first adopted the name "Rotary International" in 1922 when the name was changed from the International Association of Rotary Clubs.
- 4. Rotary first established the Paul Harris Fellows recognition in 1957 for contributors of \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation.
- 5. The Rotary emblem was printed on a commemorative stamp for the first time in 1931 at the time of the Vienna Convention.
- The first Rotary club banner (from the Houston Space Center) to orbit the moon was carried by astronaut Frank Borman, a member of that club.
- 7. The first head of state to address a Rotary convention was U.S. President Warren G. Harding in 1923 at St. Louis.
