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

Roald Tweet

Since 1995, historian and folklorist Dr. Roald Tweet has been spinning his stories of the Mississippi Valley to a devoted audience on WVIK. Dr. Tweet has published three books as well as numerous literary articles and recorded segments of "Rock Island Lines." His inspiration is a "kidney-shaped limestone island plunked down in the middle of the Mississippi River," a logical site for a storyteller like Dr. Tweet.

It is from Rock Island's rich heritage that Dr. Tweet spins his histories, biographies and "stretchers." Among his favorite topics are railroads and riverboats, which he combines on a CD in celebration of the Grand Excursion 2004. "Rock Island Lines with Roald Tweet"

has received awards from the Illinois Historical Society as well as the Towner Award from the Illinois Humanities Council.

Dr. Tweet is professor emeritus, retired from the Augustana College English department, where he was professor and Conrad Bergendoff Chair in the Humanities. A writer and radio personality, Dr. Tweet is also an accomplished woodcarver and whittler.

\$630 million pledged to polio eradication

Bill Tubbs report about polio eradication and the Gates Challenge at North Scott Rotary, Jan. 23:

For the past three years I've had the opportunity to work with the presidents of Rotary International on the 8-member Rotary International Public Image Resource Group as the Public Relations Coordinator for North America. The terms are one year at a time and usually no more than three years, but earlier this week, John Kenny, our incoming RI President who is from Scotland, asked me to serve another year and I agreed. The invitation came at a very busy time for the Public Relations team because there was a major worldwide announcement involving Rotary this week.

On Wednesday, Jan. 21, at the International Assembly in San Diego, where the next year's theme is announced and 530 incoming district governors from all around the world receive training, Bill Gates stood before the assembled Rotarians and announced that his foundation will give \$255 million toward Rotary's global campaign to eradicate polio. Additionally, the United Kingdom will give \$150 million, and Germany will give \$130 million. Those amounts, plus an additional \$100 million that Rotary pledged to raise by 2012, total \$630 million.

The Gates pledge is in addition to \$100 million that they gave in the summer of 2007. Rotarians were challenged to raise \$100 million by Dec. 31, 2010 (three years) to match that amount and we're still working on it – worldwide, we are currently about two thirds of the way toward our first \$100 million. And now we have pledged to raise an additional \$100 million. That's a lot of money but, as the preacher said, "The good news is that we have the money for the building project. The bad news is – it's in your pockets!"

So the global campaign against polio is not finished and our continued support is needed. This time, however, our match will be 1:2.5 rather than 1:1. How much will be expected of clubs and individual Rotarians and how it will be raised is yet to be determined, but I'm sure that President-Elect Chuck Briegel and club leaders will be hearing a lot about this at the upcoming district meetings and it will take the support and involvement of each of us. When that time comes, I urge you to follow Chuck's lead.

For the benefit of all members, but especially our newer members, when Rotary announced the campaign to eradicate polio in 1987-88, there were 350,000 new cases of polio every year in 125 countries. Rotary was asked to raise \$120 million and more than doubled that in the initial campaign. As of last December, before Wednesday's announcement, Rotary had committed \$850 million to polio eradication, which is more than any other source except the U.S. government, which had given \$1.4 billion.

Rotarians also provided on-the-ground vocational and logistical support in getting the vaccines into remote regions. Working together with our partners, the World Health Organization, UNICEF and the Centers for Disease Control, we have administered the oral polio vaccine to more than 2 billion children, and saved 8 million lives. Unfortunately, the job is not finished. While the global case count was just 784 in 2003, it climbed to 1,625 last year with 788 confirmed cases in Nigeria, many of them in the very places I visited in 2007. Nigeria is one of four remaining polio-endemic countries, with India, Pakistan and Afghanistan.

A debate has been engaged at the highest levels of Rotary on strategies of "containment" versus "eradication." Some argued that we should declare victory since the case count has dropped by 99 percent, but eradication prevailed. Polio is like a forest fire, it was explained. You keep at it until the last spark is extinguished, or it flares up again. As long as the wild polio virus is alive anywhere, it can spread everywhere. We are doing this for all the children of the world – including our own. Further, an analysis at Harvard University concluded that the cost of "control" over a 20-year period would exceed, by billions of dollars, the cost of eradication. And in human terms alone, they concluded, a polio control program that relies on routine immunization alone would result in over 200,000 children paralyzed by polio each year and for Rotarians, that was unacceptable – so we soldier on at a cost of \$60 million per month to engage 3,500 full-time health professionals, thousands of national and public health workers, legions of volunteers, 147 certified laboratories, and a huge surveillance system.

The Gates Foundation has earned the right to be selective in how they spend their money, and this week's pledge demonstrates Rotary's credibility that private foundations look to us for leadership with such large amounts. That's why we wear our Rotary pins with pride. The World Health Organization has made polio eradication its No. 1 operational priority. So now it's up to us. Rotarians in the 63 clubs of District 6000, since 1987, have contributed \$1.7 million to polio eradication but the job is not finished. So we continue. Details will come later, but President-Elect Kenny's theme for 2009-10, which was announced this week, sums it up: "The Future of Rotary is in Your Hands." Thank you.
