YOUTH EXCHANGE WEEKEND

This weekend, March 7 & 8, North Scott Rotary is sponsoring a 24 hour event at the Steeplegate Inn for all the D6000 inbound and outbound Youth Exchange students. This will be attended by about 20 students, 5 Rotex college students and several members of the District YE committee, as chaperones. This is the 3rd year we have held this function. It was originated in 2007 when Christina Michaelis was at our club from Germany. The students longed to spend time together without a structured class schedule. They just wanted to hang out and have fun. Chris planned the gathering, with help, that first year, and the past 2 years, this event has been primarily coordinated by Shari Bender, who was an outbound student in Christina's home in Germany, when Chris was here.

A "pony express" method of transportation is formed to move the students across the State of Iowa to Davenport. They come from as far away as Corning and Leon, Chariton and Winterset, Iowa. Upon arriving at the hotel, they get reacquainted and usually go swimming or play games. Later in the day, we have pizza, go ice skating at the Quad City Sports Center, look for eagles on the Mississippi River and go up into the sky bridge. Many languages are spoken, and lasting friendships are made. Some sleep and some stay up all night and wait for the delicious breakfast served by the Steeplegate.

SCOTT CRANE - United Way of Q.C.

Mr. Scott Crane, current president of the United Way of the Quad Cities, presented some interesting facts to 59 Rotarians and guests. There are 1300 United Way organizations in the United States. They are all, of course, non profit organizations. Each year the United Way holds an annual campaign to raise funds to work with. Record amounts were raised in the Fall of 2008.

The United Way mobilizes communities to provide support services for individuals and families that need help to improve their lives. They help provide homeless shelters in Davenport, especially after the collapse of the John Lewis coffee house. They provide funds for the Imagination Library, which provides books to children, infant to age 5. This was started by Dolly Parton and is available to children who reside in Scott and Rock Island counties.

Mr. Crane told of some programs available in 2009, including a 10K run held in the Q.C. for kids on April 18. Also, a 5K race and family walk to be held, May 16. Underprivileged children will be awarded with an admission to a concert after performing 10 hours of community service work.

Chuck Briegel presided over the business meeting, while President Gary vacations, some where warm. Guests present were, Larry Patten, guest of James Patten and Mary Macoumber-Schmidt, guest of Dr. Anita Wubbena. Rotarian Donna Seiver and the Steeplegate baked a special cake honoring Rotary's 104th birthday.
