Joel G. Himsl Garrison Manger US Army Garrison, Rock Island Arsenal



Mr. Joel G. Himsl became the Garrison Manager for the US Army Garrison Rock Island Arsenal following a 30 year military career in the U.S. Army. In his role as Garrison manager he is responsible for leading base operations activities including; public works, logistics, moral welfare and recreation, safety, resource management, and force protection information along with a host of community support functions.

He has extensive installation management experience including assignments as Commander, US Army Garrison Fort Monmouth, NJ; Commander USAG Fort Leonard Wood, MO; Executive Officer for the Assistant Chief of Staff for Installation Management; and most recently as Deputy Director, Northwest Region, installation Management Command.

His broad military experience includes three assignments to the Pentagon where he served on the Army staff as a

Congressional Activities Officer and Assistant to the Director of Army Staff; speechwriter for the Chief of Staff of the Army and Executive Officer to the ACSIM. He also served as the chief of an Antiterrorism-Force Protection Team for the US Central Command in Saudi Arabia; Chief of the Antiterrorism-Force Protection cell for the Multi-National Corps-Iraq; battalion and brigade operations officer, and various other significant Military Police Corps assignments.

Himsl earned numerous awards and decorations during his military career including the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star Medal, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal, the Parachutist Badge, the Ranger Tab, and the Army Staff Identification Badge.

A native of Minnesota, he attended St. John's University, Collegeville, MN, where he earned a bachelor of arts in History. Mr. Himsl attended numerous professional military schools and is a graduate of both the Command and General Staff College and the Army War College.

Bettendorf, Central, Clinton, North Scott, West win first-place awards in sportsmanship

Sportsmanship was better, on average, in four of five fall and winter sports, in ratings by game officials released today (April 15) in the Rotary International/Mississippi Athletic Conference sportsmanship awards competition. First-place winners for best sportsmanship were: North Scott (football), Bettendorf, North Scott and Davenport West (volleyball), Davenport Central (boys' basketball), Clinton (girls' basketball), and Davenport West (wrestling).

First-place banners will be presented at the spring meeting of the Mississippi Athletic Conference coaches and athletic directors, April 15 at 7:00 p.m. at Davenport North High School.

The average ratings (lower is better) improved in all sports except girls' basketball. In 2007, the average rating in football was 1.67 compared with 1.36 in 2008. In volleyball, the average rating of 1.19 in 2007 dropped to 1.08 in 2008. Similar improvement was recorded for boys' basketball (1.71 to 1.36) and wrestling (1.42 to 1.30). Average ratings for girls' basketball were slightly higher, from 1.44 to 1.49.

The ratings, turned in by game officials after each contest, are on the following scale: 1) Outstanding, all positive happenings; 2) Above average, desirable sports climate; 3) Acceptable, mostly positive but not perfect; 4) Needs improvement, some minor negatives; and 5) Unacceptable for high school sports.

Mike Botts, commissioner of officials, commented: "The Rotary awards have made a significant impact on the sportsmanship displayed at events. The conference as a whole has an excellent overall rating in all sports."

Bill Tubbs, Rotary project coordinator, added: "Despite a small number of well publicized negative events, the game officials, those who are closest to the action, said that sportsmanship, overall, was better. The Rotary clubs of the Mississippi Athletic Conference are delighted to sponsor this program and thank the game officials and athletic directors for their involvement and support."

In football, North Scott's average for coaches, players and fans for the season was 1.11, edging secondplace Bettendorf (1.23) and third-place Davenport West (1.24). In volleyball, tri-champions Bettendorf, North Scott and Davenport West recorded perfect 1.00 scores for the season. Burlington and Davenport Central were close behind at 1.07.

In boys' basketball, Davenport Central rated a 1.12 average, while second-place Davenport West tallied 1.24 and third-place Bettendorf had a rating of 1.27. In girls' basketball, Clinton won with an average rating of 1.16, while Muscatine took second at 1.24, and Bettendorf and North Scott tied for third at 1.43. In wrestling, Davenport West's 1.21 edged second-place Pleasant Valley's 1.23 and third-place Bettendorf's 1.25

The awards – attractive banners for display in gymnasiums – are sponsored by the Rotary clubs of Bettendorf, Burlington, Clinton, Davenport, Iowa Quad Cities, Muscatine and North Scott.

Awards are presented annually in nine sports: volleyball, football, boys' and girls' basketball, wrestling, boys' and girls' soccer, baseball and softball, plus overall awards for boys' and girls' sports.

Motion for the Adoption of a Temporary Membership Status

Whereas the Board of Directors of the Rotary Club of North Scott recognizes that during these unprecedented times of economic uncertainty, members may be impacted by job loss. Such job loss may cause a member to feel that continued participation in the club as a Regular Member, paying full, quarterly membership dues cannot be justified.

Therefore in recognition of this short-term situation, the following temporary membership status in the Rotary Club of North Scott is established by the Board of Directors and is effective with the approval by a quorum of the Board of Directors.

This temporary **Career Transition Member** (CTM) membership status will be defined as follows:

- The North Scott Executive Secretary or the President of the Club will be informed of job loss by the impacted regular member.
- Career Transition Member (CTM) status will be approved by the Executive Secretary or the President of the Club and requesting member will be informed of their eligibility for this membership status by the Club's Executive Secretary.
- CTM status will be effective the month following the approval of the request and be in force for the next 3 consecutive months.
- CTM's dues will be reduced for the 3 month period to \$5 per meal eaten at the Friday noon meeting. No general membership dues or other assessment will be invoiced during the CTM status.
- If during the 3 month period of CTM status, member returned to full time employment, they will automatically be moved back to regular member status, with regular member dues and assessments, effective the first month following notification to the Executive Secretary of full time employment.
- If, at the end of the 3 month period of CTM status, member does not acquire full time employment, a 3 month extension of the CTM status can be requested to the Executive Secretary by the member.
- After two, 3 month periods in the CTM status, member will be automatically returned to regular member status with regular member dues and assessment back in force. At that time it is the accountability of the member to confirm their continued membership in the club, to resign the club, or to request some other currently recognized status (leave of absence, etc.) which is subject to appropriate approvals.

The Board of Directors of the Rotary Club of North Scott reserves the right to extend the CTM member status at anytime with the approval of the Board of Directors.
