Executive Director of United Neighbors



Dr. Ida Johnson, the executive director of United Neighbors, was honored Sept. 24 as one of Iowa's most valued history makers at the 2009 History Makers Gala in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Johnson had the original idea for United Neighbors 35 years ago as a young mother who wanted to create a safe place for her children to play. Before long, she was managing a small community action agency out of her home. Today, the agency has grown to a busy neighborhood center with a wide range of free services available to everyone in the Iowa Quad-Cities.

United Neighbors, located at 808 Harrison St., Davenport, provides after-school programs, emergency assistance and referrals, first-time homebuyer classes, lead-based paint repair, budget counseling, a summer parks youth program, awareness training for breast and prostate cancer, programming for senior citizens, computer training and a variety of other services.

**School Shop Special Efforts on our behalf**

Here is a report received from Dr. Anita on the efforts put forth by a group of our Rotarians.. This was in the form of an e-mail, which I chose to include as received so that all the rest of us could have a feel of the effort put into this.

.150 pairs of boots and 150 pairs of gloves were bought from help from Davenport Rotarian, and General Manager of Wal-Mart on Elmore, Tony Ciabattoni, and West Kimberly Wal-Mart, General Manager, Dan Cosner helped when Tony didn't have enough boys boots.

The boots were mixed for girls and boys with sizes for kids K-3rd grade, We had did some preliminary checking with the school nurses about what the needs really are, ie coats, boots,

etc. From my understanding there had been a coat drive from the AEA so coats were plentiful, and the real need was boots. If they do not have boots they are not allowed to go outside for recess! Hence no release of all that youthful energy.

Kristine, Sheila and I delivered approximately 30 pairs of boots and gloves, mixed in gender and size to all 5 elementary schools in the North Scott district, Ed White, Alan Shephard, Neil Armstrong, Virgil Grissom, and John Glenn. ( we only took pics at Neil Armstrong, and I think one at Grissom, we wanted to hit all of them before the school had lunch so if any of the kids needed them, they would have them by the first snowfall) We left the boots and gloves with the nurses. Thru talking with the nurses in preliminary arrangements we would drop off at the schools and if they needed a different size they would contact the other buildings and negotiate trades. The nurses are controlling the distribution and storing the boots at each building so when the need arises the boots are there.

We are unsure how quickly they will go thru the supply, but hopefully they will have enough to get thru this year! It can be evaluated next year to see if the need is still the same and should we purchase items again.

The boots and gloves were graciously received and thoroughly appreciated!

Dear Rotarians

I am sure everyone has seen and are continuing to see reports of the massive destruction in Haiti due to the recent earthquake. As days go by the reports seem to only get worse. Below is a quote taken from a relief organization that is working in Haiti.

*Haiti, the poorest nation in the western hemisphere, already was reeling from the effects of a devastated economy, extensive poverty, poor infrastructure, and last year's floods, which wiped out crops and washed away roads and homes. The earthquake on Jan. 12, 2010, brought further damage to a country that already was suffering. Homes and major buildings have collapsed or tumbled down hillsides. The streets are filled with sounds and sights of grief and anguish, as survivors walk through rows of bodies pulled from the rubble of Port au Prince, the capital city of Haiti. Families choke the city's streets and open spaces, terrified to return to buildings that still might collapse from earlier damage or continued aftershocks.*

As Rotarians, we are feeling the pain of the Haitians when we witness this kind of massive loss. As an organization one is moved to action.

As result of discussing District 6000's options with Jim Riordan, our District 6000 Disaster Relief Chair from the Rotary Club of Waukee, we have identified two possible avenues of response.

1. **Meals From the Heartland** (Des Moines area) and **Kids Against Hunger** (Southeast Iowa, Brighton). These two sister organizations are involved with packaging dries food stuffs into sealed bags that are sent to countries that are in need of food for starving and undernourished people. Each sealed bag, when packaged, contains fortified rice-soy chicken flavored casserole with 7 dried vegetables and over 20 vitamins and minerals. The mixture was created by a team of food scientists to fight the affects of starvation. Each bag contains 13.8 oz of materials that will produce 6 one cup meals at the cost of 25 cents per meal. \$10.00 will feed 40 children, \$50.00 will feed 200 children. Rotarians can make contributions to pay for these meals that will be sent to Haiti to feed the people who are in need of nutritious meals.
2. **World Vision International.**  
World Vision and District 6000 are currently working together to provide Micro-credit for residents of Sri Lanka who are working hard to recover from the tsunami that destroyed their country. World Vision agreed to match the contributions from District 6000 at a one dollar to one dollar level, therefore every \$1000 dollars we contributed were matched by \$1000 from World Vision.

The exciting news is that World Vision has agreed to match any contributions sent to them from District 6000 for Haiti, again, at a one to one level. Because of this match, every \$1000 dollars contribution from District 6000 will be matched by \$1000 from World Vision.

World Vision has a long history of working alongside the people of Haiti. They have provided relief and long-term development assistance for 31 years. More than 52,000 children receive the benefits of child sponsorship through 20 community development programs supported by U.S. donors and donors worldwide. More than 320,000 people are being helped by World Vision programs that target education, health and sanitation, economic development, and advocacy for the poor. Other special programs target clean water, food security, sustainable agriculture, and HIV and AIDS. The World Vision staff in Haiti numbers more than 370 people, plus volunteers.

World Vision has experience responding to disasters in Haiti and worldwide. Last year, they responded to dozens of emergencies, including devastating floods that hit Haiti during hurricane season. Thanks to generous donors, World Vision was able to provide much-needed assistance to thousands of children and their families following the floods.

Donation to World Vision can help provide much needed assistance to people in Haiti who have been injured and lost homes and belongings in the earthquake.

Here are just a few examples of how your donation can make a difference:

- \$5,000 can provide Family Survival Kits to 50 families.
  - \$13,000 can provide hygiene kits, containing items like soap, washcloths, toothbrushes, toilet paper, and feminine hygiene products, to 300 families.
  - \$32,500 can provide 10,000 families with water containers used to transport and store water.
- \$130,000 can provide up to 450 families with materials, such as tarps, wooden poles, and iron sheets, to build temporary and safe shelters.

If you prefer that the money goes to one of the two initiatives please specify which one you prefer. If a preference is not made the money will be distributed between these two initiatives.
