Kristi is a long time Quad City resident, graduating from Central High School in Davenport and earning her BA degree from Western Illinois University and her Master in Social

Work degree from the University of Illinois. She has worked in the social work field for over 30 years and in her last position was the Director of programs for a state-wide child welfare organization. She has been with Habitat for just over 5 years now and serves as the Executive Director.

Mission: Habitat for Humanity Quad Cities (HFHQC) works in partnership with God and people from all walks of life to build simple, decent, affordable housing and improve our community so all people can live as God intended.

ABOUT HFHI

- Habitat for Humanity International (HFHI) is a non-profit Christian housing organization founded in 1976.
 - HFHI is at work in 100 countries.
 - A Habitat house is built every 22 minutes.
- Habitat homes shelter more than 1.5 million people.

ABOUT HFH QUAD CITIES

- Since 1993, HFHQC has built 68 homes, providing shelter for 280 individuals.
 - HFHQC will complete 6 houses in 2010 and 5-6 in 2011.
 - HFHQC is powered by more than 3,000 volunteers and donations from individuals, businesses, foundations, organizations, and faith communities.
- Milestones include: a 24 hour build for paralyzed high school

football player Travis Hearn, the 50th house which was built and funded by 50 churches, and the construction of the affiliate's 1st housing community- Habitat Park in Rock Island.

WHAT WE DO

- Build 3 styles of homes featuring approximately 1,040 sq. ft. with 3-4 bedrooms, and 1-2 baths depending on family size, as well as a basement.
- Construct homes costing \$80,000- \$85,000 on average after in-kind donations and volunteer labor.
- Acquire lots through donations, with minimal funds allocated for purchase.
- Select partner families based on need, ability to pay a mortgage, and willingness to partner, which includes earning 250 hours of "sweat equity" per adult.
- Educate homeowners through a series of 10 classes on topics such as budgeting, home maintenance, financial management, and conflict resolution.
- Hold the mortgage after partner families purchase their homes with a 1% down payment and no-interest mortgage. Operate the Habitat ReStore, located at 3629 Mississippi Ave, in Davenport, which accepts and resells new and used building materials to support HFHQC and divert waste.

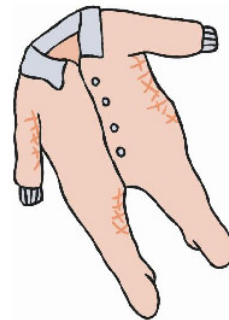

Meeting Notes January 14, 2011

Kurt Lokenvitz – Hertz Farm Management

Fifty six members were present to hear Bettendorf Rotarian, Kurt Lokenvitz educate us about the services and philosophies of his employer, Hertz Farm Management, headquartered in Nevada, Iowa. Mr. Carl Hertz formed the company in 1946. The company is 65 years old and currently Randy Hertz is chairman of the board. It is an employee owned company and has 16 offices in 4 states, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana and Nebraska. Ken Tank mentioned that he attended ISU with Joel Hertz, who is now retired from Hertz.

Kurt works out of the Geneseo office and has been with the company since July 2008. Margo met up with Kurt at the Farm Progress Show last fall and thought he would be of interest to our agricultural minded members. Hertz provides farm management services for farmers, whether they are involved with their acres or are absent owners. One of Hertz's main goals is to teach clients how to better understand their farming operation and investment. They also help provide transition and continuity.

Hertz Farm Management draws up a yearly contract with the land owner. Hertz fee is usually based on a per cent of the land owner's income per acre. They also employ Farm Real Estate sales people. Farm land prices are

generally on the increase in Iowa. Is farm land the next bubble?

President Charlie told about the 4 pilot programs that RI will be testing in 200 clubs, next year. He read the thank you note from Dorothy and told of a polio immunization in India, Feb. 22-March 3. Bill Tubbs will be going to the project fairs held in Mexico, last week of January. Dr. Anita gave the details about the pajama party for females only coming up February 10. Kelly did the same for Special Olympics on February 5 and Jody for the Valentine lunch on February 11. More details are on the calendar of events.

Jeff Helms thanked the club from his wife, Mindy, for the coats given to Adams Elementary school, where she teaches third grade. She is grateful that her students were remembered.
