Save the date, August 21, 2010 for the first Quad Cities Paddlesports Festival and a sanctioned Guinness World Records attempt to amass the world's largest raft of canoes and kayaks Officially, the current record is 1,104 boats and Floatzilla 2010 is seeking to put together 2,010 kayaks and canoes. However, Pittsburgh's [Paddle at the Point](#) may have raised the bar to approximately 1,700 boats on June 5, 2010. In addition to the world record attempt [[at 2 p.m. at Lake Potter](#)], the festival will include group trips [[launches start at 9 a.m.](#)] on the new Quad Cities water trails, beginner-friendly paddling lessons and programs. The registration fee is \$10 per paddler or \$20 for a premium package that includes discounts off hotel rooms, restaurants, and more. Rotary: Not Just Lunch with Leaders

Every year at Assumption, seniors are selected to be Junior Rotarians. Despite this tradition at AHS, many students still ask their peers what “Rotary” is, and are met with the response that it’s merely lunch with business leaders in the community. However, that is just one very small part of Rotary. In actuality, there are over 33,000 Rotary clubs worldwide, with over 1.2 million members who serve on a volunteer basis not only in their local communities, but worldwide.

In fact, Rotary International was responsible for initiating a most-ambitious program—PolioPlus, which has sought to eliminate polio throughout the world. In 1985, when the program began, there were 125 countries where polio outbreaks could be found, totaling over 350,000 cases worldwide. Now, only twenty five years later, polio has been eradicated in all but four countries – Pakistan, Afghanistan, India, and Nigeria (P.A.I.N.). Rotary’s work has helped bring the number of polio cases in the world to its lowest level in history.

To fully eradicate polio from the world, Rotary now needs greater outside financial help. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation answered the call through the \$200 Million Challenge. Gates has

agreed to match every dollar donated towards the \$200 million goal.

One man, Finbar O’Sullivan, took on the challenge by starting Peaks for Polio. He and six others climbed the 23,000 foot Mount Aconcagua in Argentina and raised \$46,000 for Polio relief in just one journey. O’Sullivan hopes to continue this tradition until the \$200 million challenge has been conquered.

Clearly, the narrow understanding of Rotary that many Assumption students possess falls short of reality. So, when the next person asks, “What is Rotary?” one can now hopefully respond with more than the typical “lunch with leaders.”

Who's eligible?

- Non-Rotarians between the ages of 25 and 40 who are unrelated to Rotarians.
- Professionals who are committed to staying in their profession after the exchange.
- Team members who live or work in District 6000 (roughly half of Iowa south of Highway 30, excluding Cedar Rapids).
- Exemplary representatives of the state and nation. Members should be courteous, flexible, enthusiastic about their vocations and passionate about exploring another culture.

Who's going? We'll select four team members, who will be led by Jeffrey Anderson of the Boone Rotary Club.

Who pays for this? Rotary International provides flights. The hosts provide housing (typically at Rotarian homes), meals, entertainment and transportation. Team members are responsible for obtaining passports and health/travel insurance and buying small gifts for hosts, team uniforms and incidentals.

How do I apply?

- Find application forms at www.rotary6000.org in the left column under FOUNDATION, then Group Study Exchange.
- Obtain written permission from your employer to take leave for the four-week trip.
- Secure a signed endorsement from a Rotary club in District 6000. To find a list of clubs, see Club Directory & Contact at the district website.
- Send completed applications (including essay, Rotary endorsement and employer letter) to Lynn Hicks, GSE chairman, at lynhyx@gmail.com, by Aug. 20.
- Be available for interviews on Saturday, Aug. 28, at a location to be determined.

MICHELE ALLISON: JUAN DIEZ RANCHEROS July 16, 2010

Michele first quoted the Bible Verse John 10:10. "The thief's purpose is to steal, kill and destroy. My purpose is to give life in all its fullness." Michele is currently counseling children that are suffering from physical, sexual or emotional abuse. She uses 10 horses that have been given to her. They are usually unwanted and some have been abused. They vary in size, from very large to small, similar size of a dog. Michele has 30 years of experience with horses and keeps them in the now closed, Fejervary Park Zoo. The city does not charge her to use the grounds; she only has to maintain them. She uses the bison, elk and deer pens.

Her therapy consists of feeling squares that contain hula hoops, noodles or similar objects. The areas are anger, happy, sad, etc. Her small horse is disappointment. Lately a young girl that she had in therapy connected with the small horse and braided her mane. She let herself have fun with the horse and is also improving at home.

Michele does not charge for her services. She depends entirely on donations. She has received money from the RDA and holds fundraisers. She currently is selling pizza cards. The therapy sessions are very private and last from

30 to 60 minutes, depending on the age of the child. Groups like Family Resources and Vera French refer clients to her. Mike Mickle is working on a video for her.

Charlie Jones led his first meeting. Scott Case presented Jeremy with the W.F.Tubbs award, see previous article. Some more perfect attendance awards were handed out. Seventy members and guests were in attendance. Guests were Rotarians, Ardo Holmgram from Rock Island Club, Brock Earnhardt from Davenport Club and Mike Wernsman from Milan Club. Other guests were Rob Miltenberger, Mickel Alonso, Evan Kurtz, Maggie Patten and Erica Gilmore.
