Hand-in-Hand is also expanding some activities to serve adults with disabilities. Our activities are planned with the age and ability level of each individual in mind. Children with a wide variety of mental, physical and medical needs are welcomed participants in all of our programs.

How We Began:

Hand-in-Hand is the concept of two sets of parents with special needs children. Mark and Vinnie Smith, and Dave and Joanie Steil both had a dream of seeing their children afforded the same opportunities available to typical children. Unfortunately the Steils were unable to realize this dream for their daughter Tessa as she passed away in May of 1999. However, knowing the positive impact she made on many lives, these parents wish to keep her wonderful spirit alive by making this unique and exciting respite program a reality

Polio Plus

Did you know that more than 10 million children will be paralyzed in the next 40 years if the world fails to eradicate polio? Embark on a virtual tour of “Whatever Happened to Polio?” an exhibit of the Smithsonian’s National Museum of American History that chronicles the history of the disease and efforts to eradicate it. The exhibit is now on permanent display at the Roosevelt Warm Springs Institute for Rehabilitation.

Polio eradication is within our grasp. But if we don’t eradicate the disease now, the risk of crippling and deadly polio outbreaks will continue to threaten the world’s children. Sixty two members and guests attended on Friday, as Dee told us all about the new (and improved) SECC or Scott Emergency Communications Center. This facility is in its final stages of building and will with stand an F5 tornado. It is expected to be completed and ready to move in to, in the spring of 2011 and will offer improved services. There will be two main organizations under one roof, fire and personal emergency services. In the long run, capitol costs will be saved, due to combining 3 systems.

There was an extreme need to improve the dispatch services for everyone and to operate one records system to connect all Quad City public safety issues. A world class architect was hired to design and build the structure on Tremont Avenue in Davenport. 32 agencies will carry 1489 radios. Some of the radio towers are actually outside of Scott County because of the bluffs we have along the river.

Sergeant Eric Langan raised \$43 in fines and promised to double that amount to the education fund if Iowa beat Michigan in the big house. Well Eric, guess its 2 years in a row! Jan Trimble won the 50/50 auction drawing and went home \$93 richer. Margo McInnis purchased Lisa's peach pie for \$100. Jim Koehler was proud to announce that the auction (as of Fri. noon) had 160 items to sell. He commends his committee and is very thankful to Anita for keeping the items all logged and

organized on her computer.

Jerry Coussens was present as a guest of Jim Smith. Monica Forret, member and past president of the Davenport Club was present to invite everyone to their fund raiser on November 6. Tickets are \$45 each and it is "Murder in a double wide" at the Rock Island Country Club. Contact any Davenport member to line up a ticket.

Bill Tubbs told of the death of former member Arnie Irwin. He also explained the new D6000 Paul Hellwege award. The application is due in January and Bill hopes that North Scott Rotary will have a nominee.
