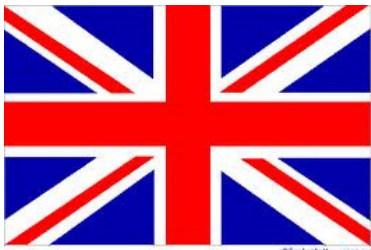

Rotary FriendShip Exchange

New and Old Friends Worldwide



A Rotary Friendship Exchange from The East Midlands of England will be visiting our club this Friday. They are visiting District 6420 and 6440, both in Illinois. 6420 includes the Quad Cities Rock Island Club. There are 3 couples and one man. Come hear of their adventures and experiences while visiting their fellow Rotarians.

Below is a brief overview of Rotary Friendship Exchange.

A group of Japanese Rotarians renew old friendships made at an RI Convention with club members from Australia. Italian Rotarian parents of a former Rotary Youth Exchange student spend time with the family who hosted their son in Thailand. Rotarian pediatricians from Ghana travel to Germany to stay with doctors there.

Experiences like these happen all the time through Rotary Friendship Exchange, Rotary's international exchange program for Rotarians and their families. Participants experience other cultures and build friendships by staying in the homes of Rotary club

members in another country. This program advances international understanding and peace through personal contact across borders while developing interclub relationships that lead to fellowship and service projects.

How it works

Types of Friendship Exchanges

- Visitor program Individual Rotarians, who may be accompanied by family members, spend a few days in a Rotarian's home abroad.
- Team program Rotarian couples (typically four to six) visit several communities in a host district for up to one month.

Univocational Rotarians of the same occupation observe how their job is done in other countries.

Guidelines

- Only Rotarians and their immediate families are eligible for the visitor program, and participation in the team program is limited to Rotarians and their spouses.
- Spouses or children must always be accompanied by Rotarians on an exchange.
- Rotarians interested in participating must apply through their club president. Not every district participates in Friendship Exchange, so prospective applicants should ask their club president about the program.

District governors from participating districts appoint a district Friendship Exchange chair, who is responsible for coordinating exchanges through a list of chairs from around the world. E-mail friendshipexchange@rotary.org to identify your district chair.

Some information from the board:
Funds come to the club in several ways: membership dues, fundraisers, sarge fines and donations. Membership dues are mainly used for Steeplegate meals, International Dues, District Dues, and NS Rotary Club expenses. Our fundraisers pay for community needs, scholarship fund and international projects such as Iowa MOST and FAMSCO. Fines can be designated to a particular program or into the general fund. Donations go to wherever the donor designates. The use of all money is approved by the Board of Directors with input from our community needs committee on local needs.

Here are some clarifications and changes on the reduced fee status, available if members need to leave Rotary on a temporary basis due to leaving for the winter, change in job status or a personal event prompting this need. A request must be submitted in writing and if approved, will be in effect for up to 6 months. At that time, members must either return to full payment or request some additional time with the reason(s) explained. The cost for this status will also be increased to \$100.00 including Paul Harris Fellow.

In addition to this option, we also have a Career Transition Member status that allow a member who has lost a job to continue to attend regular club meetings for \$5.00 and not pay dues or other fees for three months. This can be extended, upon request, for an additional three months. This status is discontinued effective the first month following securement of employment.
