
Foundation Minute

ALFRED RAMIREZ, PRESIDENT, DIVERSE STRATEGIES NOW

Diversity is one of Rotary's five Core Values*, which makes the message of Friday's speaker, Alfred Ramirez, the president of Diverse Strategies Now, especially relevant. Mr. Ramirez, of East Moline, is a frequent keynote speaker, trainer and facilitator for public and private organizations, businesses, K-12 schools, universities and communities nationwide. He is innovative and versatile, as he develops and improves national, regional and local organizations and programs across diverse socio-economic sectors. He creates or implements: Diversity, inclusion and engagement initiatives; community engagement and development; business development; leadership development; and program and policy shifts toward systemic change. As a mentor and coach to

many individuals, he strives to increase their individual capacity for impact at home, work or community.

Mr. Ramirez served President Clinton as Associate Director in the White House Office of Presidential Personnel; Senior Advisor at the Corporation for National Service; and Executive Director of the White House Initiative on Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans at the U.S. Department of Education.

He began his career as faculty adviser and assistant director of admissions and minority recruitment for Columbia University. He was special assistant to Mayor Henry Cisneros of San Antonio, Texas, and a corporate recruiter and human resource specialist at Transamerica. He developed young minority leaders as managing director for INROADS Los Angeles. He also directed a \$2-million Mattel Foundation initiative to involve parents and community members in their schools. He has

worked as principal consultant for diversity initiatives at ACT, Inc. educational testing. He served as president of the Greater Quad Cities Hispanic Chamber of Commerce (GQCHCC), Group O Vice President of Government Relations and Diversity, and Director of Operations for the United States Hispanic Leadership Institute (USHLI).

He was selected as one of Hispanic Business Magazine's 100 Influentials and one of *The Des Moines Register* newspaper's Top Influentials. He attended Columbia University as undergraduate, Political Science and Urban Studies and Bernard M. Baruch College, City University of New York, graduate student in Public Administration.

Thank you so much for awarding Alan Shepard Special Education Department \$2,000 to be used towards our sensory room upgrade. A sensory room is a specially designed room that combines a range of stimuli to help individuals develop and engage their senses.

As you may already know there is a rise in sensory issues. Alan Shepard's Sensory room is not only used by our Autism/Level 3 special education program but for all students that need a space to meet their sensory needs.

With your donation we will be purchasing a variety of sensory items:

Peanut ball: Encourages balance and core stabilization for an active learning posture and enhance focus by supporting your natural desire for movement.

Vibrating Pillow: provides proprioceptive input for sensory integration

Bolster Swing: challenges balance reactions and offers proper head and body alignment as children change positions to sit, straddle, swing side-to-side or front-to-back.

Multi Point Ceiling Swing Suspension Kit: Can use for a variety of swings and climbers.

A variety of finger fidgets and stress balls: Helps keep restless fingers busy while building fine motor control. Can easily be used anywhere and less distracting as larger sensory items.

Time Timer: Visual timer so students can see how much time is left. Helps ease transition times.

Gel Tiles: used for visual processing and sensory stimulation. Some students enjoy it as a calming activity as they step, sit, or push the gel around.

Squeezer: provides deep pressure, heavy work and helps with motor planning.

Mushy Smushy Bean Bag Chairs: Provides versatile seating for students and can easily be moved. Appeals to kids who need to wiggle and to all who crave tactile stimulation. Students can toss for heavy work or use as a landing pad for crashing. They can catch and throw to strengthen bilateral coordination.

When our items arrive and get situated I would love to share a picture of the 'finished product'. Thank you for your generosity and support! You have made a positive impact on the lives of many children at Alan Shepard.

Fifty-two attended on Friday as we competed with the sunny weather and the Eldridge Chamber Golf Outing. The only guest we had was Duncan Cameron from the Rotary Club of Naples, FL.

President Elect Jeremy Kaiser asked for a vote of approval from the membership for the following Rotary board positions. Josie Seymour as Presidential candidate for 2022-23, Scott Case, Tracy Lindaman, Jeff Martens and Brian Williams for the four new board members for 2019-2021 term, and Jan Touney remaining on the board for an additional year, completing Josie's board term to July of 2020. Vera French is Scott County's mental health center and is located near the West campus of Genesis Hospital. They offer residential care, outpatient care and youth and family services. They have school-based services available in all levels of schools in the greater Quad City area. Rick's House of Hope helps kids in trauma and has summer camps available. It is run by Vera French.

Dr. Vera French retired in the 1980's, she also had a PHD in mental health. The facility was established in 1949 and is celebrating its 70^{th} anniversary this year.
