# Understanding your tax bill

Our fellow North Scott Rotarian, Tony Knobbe, will deliver a presentation to help you understand your Scott County, Iowa real estate tax bill. He'll cover the roles of Auditor, Assessor, Supervisors and Treasurer, who all play a critical role in this process. He'll cover the subject of Rollback, including the recent legislative decisions affecting those calculations. The subjects of TIF, exemptions, and penalties will be highlighted as well.

Tony Knobbe was sworn in as Scott County Treasurer on January 3, 2023. He served as Scott County supervisor for six years, from 2017 through 2022, including three years as chairman. Prior to that he had served the county on its Planning and Zoning commission, and as a condemnation juror.

Tony worked for 33 years in the banking industry, including retail branch management, commercial banking management, and retired in 2015 as market president for Wells Fargo Bank in the Quad Cities. He has served on numerous non-profit, service club and faith-based boards in the Quad Cities.

The ever-evolving role of a public library was demonstrated in many ways on Friday, March 31, as Scott County Library System Director (and North Scott Rotarian) Tricia Kane and two members of her staff regaled us with an extensive list of achievements, current projects, and plans for the future.

And they brought one of the largest "show-and-tell" items of any speaker we've had – the North Scott Library Bookmobile, which sat out in the parking lot and was available for Rotarians to visit to pick up materials and get their library cards updated.

Tricia said when she began her education to become a librarian, she was asked by others "Why are you wasting your time and your tuition money? Libraries are dying. They will be dead in five years."

# Libraries not dying; they're thriving!

To that, she says today, “We weren’t dying then, and we aren’t dying now. We are thriving.”

The library system that was born out of the efforts of a schoolteacher, Edna Spies, to deliver books to children who were left out of library services because of where they lived, is the oldest county library system in the state of Iowa, forming several years before the North Scott School District.

It has a service area encompassing almost 31,000 people, with six branch locations, in Blue Grass, Buffalo, Durant, Princeton, Walcott, and the headquarters and largest location, in Eldridge.

“We started out as a mobile library and we continue with our Bookmobile,” she said. The Bookmobile visits elementary schools on a regular basis as well as preschools, daycare centers and nursing facilities.

“We try to take materials out to places that are far away from our physical branches,” she said.

Funded with a per capita tax (as opposed to a property tax), the library system has a budget of \$1.2 million a year. Grant funding, from both the state and federal governments, helps to support many special programs and services.

Christine Barth, information/technical services librarian, spoke about some of the unique local history projects the library has completed and what’s in process. “One big project we just wrapped up is the Scott County Community Memory Project,” she said. The Scott County Library was one of only 30 libraries in the country chosen to participate in this federally funded project.

“We wanted to tell the story of Scott County through individuals and organizations,” she said.

The Scott County Community Memory Project digitized close to 1,000 items and collected more than 30 oral histories. Every town in rural Scott County is represented in some way, and there is something from every decade from the 1850s to today.

The Eldridge library is home to a scanning center that allows

patrons to scan photos, documents, and even newspaper-sized items. The service is free and available anytime the library is open. Appointments are recommended.

Currently, the library is working on the history of the North Scott Community School District. Christine read from the introduction to the project and told Rotarians with a smile, “You’ll have to come to the library to check it out and read the rest.”

Digitized copies of North Scott yearbooks, editions of *The North Scott Press* and *Morning Stars* are available on the library system’s website, <https://www.scottcountyiowa.gov/library>, as is a complete schedule of library programs and activities.

“The library is transforming from a warehouse of information to a place where content is created and shared with the community,” Christine said.

Speaking next, Emily Haage, youth services coordinator, described her department as “often a center of play, learning, laughter, and exploration ..... and a little creative chaos, too.”

In addition to printed materials, the youth services department has a selection of board games and creative toys like trains and Legos that inspire imaginative play, she said. Digital media like “Playaways,” which are MP3 players loaded with one book, and Wonder books, interactive picture books that read aloud to a child, are also popular.

Reading fun extends beyond the walls of the library, Emily said, with a beautiful reading garden and story walk, which breaks down the pages of picture books and posts them along a path for families to enjoy.

New programming in the youth services area is always on the horizon, and another active Summer Reading Program is planned. Emily said this is the 20th year of the popular Battle of the Books program, where kids are quizzed on details of 19 books. Virgil Grissom elementary won the North Scott title this year.

The North Scott Rotary was thanked for its support of the library through its community grant program. One of those grants funded a “Girls That Code” club, Emily said.

Among questions asked of the library staff was one by Paul Holzworth, who asked Tricia's opinion on the growing efforts throughout the country to ban certain books. Tricia said libraries are paying attention to those efforts. "As a public library, we have a mission to build collections that represent our community, that are inclusive and inviting," she responded.

"To hear of movements like a sweeping book ban that takes the choices away from the people who are visiting, it's troubling. It's troubling at every level."

Dick Cole pointed out that he has been purchasing books at the library sales and donating them to the Scott County Jail for the use of inmates. He estimated he has taken more than 800 books to the jail. *Thank you, Dick!*
