Automobile transactions: Buyer beware!

Buyer beware, especially when it comes to vehicles.

That message was delivered with powerful examples on Friday, April 21, by speaker Matt Dingbaum, a fraud investigator for the Bureau of Investigation and Identity Protection with the Iowa Department of Transportation.

Dingbaum brought a wealth of information to North Scott Rotarians and spoke of issues like vehicle cloning, washed titles and straw buyers.

"I'm going to focus on motor vehicle fraud because that's the most we're seeing now," said Dingbaum, whose office is in the same building as the Scott County Treasurer General Store and Iowa Driver's License Services at 902 W. Kimberly Road in Davenport. North Scott Rotarian and Scott County Treasurer Tony Knobbe arranged for Dingbaum to speak. The Treasurer's Office oversees motor vehicle transfers and renewals, among many other duties and works closely with Dingbaum's office.

Dingbaum said investigators use a CARFAX vehicle history report, which is a detailed accounting of a vehicle's history, to help identify stolen vehicles, fraudulent titles and title washes, in which information, notably odometer readings, are acid-washed off the original document and replaced with lower numbers.

Dingbaum asked Rotarians how many of them pay the \$40 to run a CARFAX report before purchasing a used car, and few hands went up.

"Everybody should," he said. "CARFAX is probably the best tool that we have in everything we do because it's super convenient and easy to use."

Dingbaum, who has won several professional awards for his work in fraud prevention and detection law enforcement, brought his point home several times with specific case examples of vehicle fraud which cost unsuspecting buyers thousands of dollars.

He said odometer fraud is "way out of control. It's 10 times worse than it was in the '70s."

"If I were to roll my Toyota 4Runner from 300,000 miles to 30,000 miles, I can do it off my cellphone with a cord in less than 30 seconds," he said.

He cited one case in which a woman obtained a title for a

vehicle in Iowa that had a substantial loan on it. The title was acid-washed to eliminate the information about the \$20,000 loan on the car.

"She literally left Davenport, drove up to a Milwaukee vehicle dealer, traded it in for \$7,000 cash and a brand new Charger," Dingbaum said.

The dealer was defrauded as the bank still owned the car. "Now it's our job to work it back ... that's hard to do when two to three buyers have been involved."

The bottom line: "When you buy a vehicle, you can't get the property from a thief."

"In Cedar County, I took a \$28,000 Mustang away from somebody who bought it on Facebook Marketplace," he said. "He's got a \$28,000 loan to pay off."

He cautioned against buying vehicles on Facebook Mar-

ketplace, particularly in Illinois. Iowa does a better job in prosecuting vehicle fraud cases than Illinois, he said.

“If you see a Facebook ad on the Illinois side that’s too good to be true, tell your friends, tell your kids,” he said. “Always do your homework ... the Illinois Secretary of State Police will tell you that as well.”

He also said driver’s license and identity theft fraud is out of control.

“You can buy a driver’s license from China and get it delivered,” he said. It will be hidden discreetly in a box with an electronics item, like personal headphones. It usually costs between \$150 and \$200 for a fraudulent license.

“You are actually paying someone in China to steal your identity,” he said. “That’s what these college kids are doing. Their identity will be stolen later in life. ... Their name and date of birth will be catalogued and sold.”

He related the story of an ongoing Davenport case in which an individual who is using a fake Iowa driver’s license has had almost a half-million dollars’ worth of vehicles delivered to him.

“The only person who has seen this individual is the transport driver who has dropped the trucks off,” he said. “That’s what I have to deal with ... that’s the ghost I’m chasing.”
