## Fifty years of Quad-City theater

In April, the Rotary Club of North Scott named the Fine Arts Awards which we have sponsored since 2004, in honor of the man whom Scott Case is bringing to our podium this Friday – the "Tom Goodall Community Fine Arts Awards."

Tom served as Artistic Director/Theatre Manager at North Scott and has over 50 years of experience in theatrical staging, technical and artistic design, and direction for high school, community, and professional productions. He has done scenic design and technical directing for EIGHT high school productions selected for the International Thespian Festival, and ELEVEN for the Iowa Thespian Festival.

Tom grew up in Maquoketa and graduated from the University of Northern Iowa and St. Ambrose University. He retired as an art teacher from North Scott schools after 33 years of service, but continued to educate young Lancers as the Artistic Director and Theatre Manager for Lancer Productions until his retirement in 2023.

Tom has presented theatre and art workshops throughout the Midwest. Through his years of teaching and theatre, he has provided students with the opportunity to grow artistically and cooperatively. Tom is a member of the Iowa High School Thespian Hall of Fame and is the recipient

of the Iowa High School Musical Theater Impact Award. He has worked with the North Scott School District for 53 years and with Lancer Productions for 38 years.

Since its inaugural season in 2016, Mercado on Fifth in Moline, the popular Friday night market and entertainment venue has helped to start more than 60 new businesses, most of them minority-owned.

**Maria Ontiveros**, president of Mercado on Fifth, and Corporate Community Liaison for Milan-based Group O, told the phenomenal story of its growth and impact in a presentation to North Scott Rotarians.

“It’s a market, but it’s so much more than that,” she said. “Most of the businesses that are showcased at the market got their start because of Mercado and with the help of our team.”

“We tailor our events to the Mexican-American community – which is about 40,000 according to Census data – but it’s an environment where patrons from all demographics feel welcome,” she said.

The market is open every Friday night from the end of May through the end of September.

Mercado on Fifth was the vision of Ontiveros’ grandfather, the late **Bob Ontiveros**, who founded Group O, one of the largest Hispanic-owned companies in the United States, she said.

“He came from humble beginnings,” she said. “He had 10 brothers and sisters and grew up in a two-bedroom house in the neighborhood called Floreciente. After he retired, he devoted the majority of his time to improving the neighborhood where he grew up.”

Ontiveros said her grandfather developed an idea to build a market on a piece of land he owned.

After the 10-week pilot season in 2016, “we received so many calls from aspiring entrepreneurs who were eager to participate the next year.”



The Mercado staff identified all types of barriers for Spanish speakers who wanted to start a business.

“We learned about all the different requirements to set up a business in Illinois,” she said. “And we held people’s hands through the process, helping them study for certification, filling out paperwork, meeting with health inspectors and doing translations.”

A relationship forged with the Small Business Development Center was a significant step. Finding all the SBDC materials were in English, Mercado had its intern translate everything into Spanish.

**Maria** herself became certified to teach a food sanitation management class in Spanish at Black Hawk College. Food sanitation certification is needed if you want to own a food business or be the manager of a kitchen. “Previously, people had to drive to Chicago multiple weekends to get the certification,” she said.

Cooperative efforts by several agencies resulted in the opening of a kitchen for community use. Dozens of people use that kitchen today, she said.

After COVID-19 disrupted the 2020 season, Mercado returned to normal programming in 2021, and it has been growing ever since, she said. The City of Moline has allowed Mercado to close an additional street, 12th Street, in addition to the original 5th Avenue.

The Friday night markets feature dozens of food vendors, hand-crafted and imported crafts and clothing, live Latin music and children’s activities.

Purchase and renovation of a building has opened up an indoor space. “We are so excited,” she said. “It is a dream, right in the middle of the downtown market, and it’s a beautiful event center.”

An indoor Sunday market featuring brunch is now open weekly from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. “To me, Mercado is more than just an outdoor market,” she said. “We are very proud of what we’ve accomplished in such a short amount of time.”

Ontiveros suggested checking out Mercado’s Facebook page for future events, including the Dia de Los Muertos (Day of the Dead) parade on Saturday, Oct. 28 at 2 p.m.

## Polio: 'We hope' becomes 'We Believe'

Rotarians don't "hope" polio will be eradicated, they "believe," said pilot Peter Teahan who shocked news media in Pakistan with the remark during the May 5-July 30 Flight to End Polio. Watch for "We Believe" to become a new slogan for Rotary's 38-year campaign. Teahan shared the story at Monday's World Polio Day Dinner at the Quad-City Botanical Center hosted by Rotary clubs of the Quad Cities and attended by 100. North Scott Rotarian Bill Tubbs was on the committee and introduced the speakers. The Flight To End Polio has raised \$1.5 million, including the Gates Foundation 2:1 match, with more to come.

- FOURTH:** The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

### *Rotary Code of Conduct*

#### **As a Rotarian, I will:**

1. Exemplify the core value of integrity in all behavior and activities.
2. Use my vocational experience and talents to serve Rotary.
3. Conduct all my personal, business, and professional affairs ethically, encouraging and fostering high ethical standards as an example for others.
4. Be fair in all dealings with others and treat them with the respect due to them as fellow human beings.
5. Promote recognition and respect for all occupations which are useful to society.
6. Offer my vocational talent to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community.
7. Honor the trust that Rotary and fellow Rotarians provide and not do anything that will bring disfavor or reflect adversely on Rotary or fellow Rotarians.
8. Not seek from a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.
