In 1978, Becky Bray joined the staff at the Scott County office of Iowa State University Extension as 4-H and Youth Leader. Seventeen years later, in 1995, she was named County Extension Director, a position she has held since.

Becky will retire effective July 1, and will provide our program at North Scott Rotary on May 31, looking back at changes in ISU Extension in her 45-year career, and ahead as Extension continues to evolve to meet the changing needs of citizens.

Becky is a graduate of Dowling High School in West Des Moines and Mount Mercy College in Cedar Rapids. She earned a masters degree in Adult and Continuing Education from Northern Illinois University which she was able to get through the Quad Cities Graduate Center at Augustana College in Rock Island.

In 1998, Becky was elected to membership in North Scott Rotary and served as club president in 2011-12, a year in which our club was recognized as one of the top two in North America for carrying out a balanced program of service in the local community, and worldwide.

Creating hope in the world through social media using the Rotary Four-Way Test

Has someone ever made you feel small? Like you were worthless and nothing you could do could possibly make you fit in with the crowd? Every day, people experience despair and will beat themselves up about not being perfect, especially teenagers. As a teenager, I know what it is like to try to find who you are as a person and the type of reputation you want to create. It is easy to get caught up in the addictiveness of social media and trends. Society has put a lot of pressure on people to have and do so many things in this world. Social media can create negativity; however, if we use Rotary's Four-Way Test and use **truth, fairness, goodwill, and friendship** in our online interactions, we can create hope in the world.

The first question we should ask ourselves when we think, say, or do something on social media is, **Is it the truth?** Social media platforms such as Facebook and Twitter have come to be known for their misinformed posts found in their "News Feed." These often lead to controversies between two political parties, and fluctuate people's opinions of one another dramatically. These fake news posts can make the parties gain a negative attitude rather than an open mindset about things. If we see these and know they are not true, we can simply ignore them and before we fall into those patterns of fake news, we can stop to ask ourselves if what we are posting is the truth.

On the other hand, TikTok has algorithms that put you on different "sides" of TikTok which form your feed based on your specific interests. This has given people a place to feel comfortable sharing personal experiences and asking questions that have been frowned upon in our society for decades. As the narrative begins to shift, rather than feeling small, different, and worthless, teenagers are able to feel comfortable and confident making it easier to find themselves. Posting on a platform where people will relate to their struggles or uniqueness is all because people are posting real and true content.

The next question we should ask ourselves is if the information we are posting is **fair to all concerned**. Our society holds a lot of discrimination, but at the end of the day, it all comes down to if what we are doing is just. To better understand this, think about if what you are saying on social media is what you want to be known for, and what you stand for. Being honest about who you are and what you say to others and knowing that in the end, you are posting this content for the greater good. Some of the most heartwarming stories we have seen fall during COVID-19 when everyone was quarantined at home. Many people were alone or struggling with this big change. People began to use social media and its resources to connect with others more. Small acts of joy and kindness kept building until people's feeds were flooded with heartwarming posts about kids writing notes to send to their elderly neighbors, a grandpa on a video call with his grandson singing a song together, or simply people just sharing funny videos about what their family is doing. We have all seen social media used for the greater good, but some of

that has gone away again. Taking a minute to think about how we could use social media for the greater good can help flood our feeds with positivity again.

The third question we should be asking ourselves is if we are building **goodwill and better friendships**. When we first think of friendships we often think of the connection we build with others; however, before we can build a strong relationship with others we have to be true to ourselves and be our own friend. Creating this authenticity then helps us to be a good friend to others. Oftentimes, the influencers we follow use paid partnerships to advertise products and make more money from them. Current fashion trends, beauty standards, and endorsements of luxury items begin to look like the key to happiness and success when in reality, those influencers may never use those products again. However, influencers who post about their daily routines and aren't afraid to share their imperfections or disagreements make their content more authentic and relatable for viewers. Creating hope through the small things they think, say, and do allows us as viewers to build confidence and positivity. The best thing to do is to find accounts that you can connect with, that are going to help grow and motivate you.

The last question of the Four-Way Test asks if it is **beneficial to all concerned**. Human nature forces us to judge something within seconds of seeing it. Though what we see may be an honest and true opinion to us, it doesn't make it true to others. Unnecessary comments have gotten out of hand because of how much time people spend using social media apps and their underlying jealousy of others. Comments on people's posts include uncomfortable words like: "Don't you think you've posted enough of these?" "Is that an old picture or did you lose a little weight?" These comments are unnecessary and rude. They make people feel scared to post themselves and make them second-guess everything they do when they have done no harm. Thinking about whether the things we comment on, are comments we would want someone to say to us is an important way to know if we should really be saying that to others.

Social media holds a lot of power in today's society to shape our perceptions. Though we see countless amounts of bad and unhealthy content, we can start to change the narrative by looking at what we post through the lens of Rotary's Four-Way Test. Asking ourselves if what we are posting and commenting on is **true, fair, creates friendships, or is beneficial to all concerned** will automatically eliminate the things that make individuals feel small and worthless. Though nothing is going to change overnight, the little bit of hope we can provide through social media could be seen by someone who really needed that reminder for themselves that day. One simple post of encouragement might be what it takes for someone to gain that hope they need. And, if we all participate in the Four-Way Test, we can use social media to spread hope, worldwide.

Myron A. Lensch, 95, of Davenport, formerly of Walcott, died May 14 at The Fountains Senior Living in Bettendorf. Services were May 20, in the Runge Chapel, with burial at Davenport Memorial Park.

Myron was born Nov. 5, 1928, in Davenport. He served in the U.S. Air Force during the Korean War, stationed in Tripoli, Libya. He was united in marriage to Beverly Ann Geurink on Sept. 22, 1956, at St. Joseph Catholic Church in Davenport. She preceded him in death on May 20, 2019.

Myron and Bev farmed near Walcott for 25 years, where they raised three children. 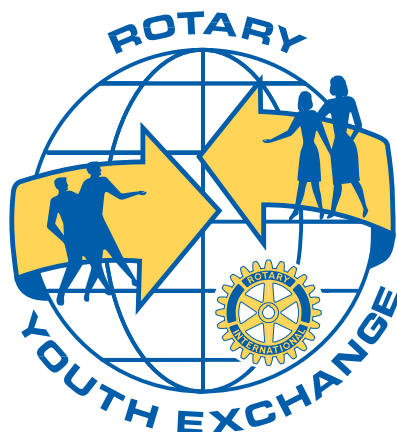
