Iowa Water Association

The Iowa Association of Water Agencies hosts the Iowa Children's Water Festival. Over 2,000 fifth-graders attend this annual event that educates Iowa students about the importance of clean and abundant sources of water in our daily lives. The Festival will be held on Thursday, May 11, 2017 at the DMACC campus rain or shine.

There are two service opportunities for metro-area Rotarians to expand youths' understanding of the water cycle, the importance of water quality to overall health, and supporting helping others access clean water:

1. Metro-area clubs intend to host a joint table in the Exhibit Hall. Each class will attend the Exhibit Hall at some point of the day. Plans are to have materials describing the Rotary Ames Club's Tanzania water projects and to briefly describe to attendees how Rotary improves lives. Rotarians will be needed for two-hour shifts at the table throughout the event, so we are seeking interest from 12-15 volunteers to set up the table, work 2-hour shifts, and take down the table.

2. Sign up to volunteer for the day, as the festival requires the help of about 200 adults from 7:30am-3:30pm. Metro-area water utility staff and Wells Fargo employees fill many needs, but more volunteers are needed. A nice Rotary presence would be 10-20 volunteers. Roles include being a class guide (walking from station to station), presenter assistant, or lunch helper. This Friday we will have a special guest and fellow Rotarian, Núbia Mesquita from Brazil, speak to us briefly about Espaco da Crianca (Kid's Place). Núbia is currently the President of Espaco da Crianca (Kid's Place), a Nongovernmental Organization serving children and families in Northeast Brazil.

Espaco da Crianca (Kid's Place) assists around 100 underprivileged children ages 4 to 12 each day, providing meals and extra-curricular classes, such as reading, art, dance, technology, religious studies, and music. The center also offers many professional development courses to the mothers and women in the community, so that they can make money to support their households and break the cycle of drug-trafficking and prostitution that plagues the community. Once a year the center holds a day of charity where residents receive free medical care, legal advice, haircuts, food, toys and clothing.

Núbia will be speaking to our Club this Friday in addition to our scheduled speaker Jody Jenner from Broadlawns Hospital.
