Aaron Putze - Iowa Soybean Assocation

Aaron Putze of the Iowa Soybean Association gave a highly engaging (he brought swag!), entertaining and informative presentation on the factors affecting soybean production and consumption all around the world.



Relatively little land around the world is suitable to growing food, Iowa is blessed with having 86%

of the land in the state being arable. As the world population has surged past 8 billion and continues to increase, the land growing crops needs to become more productive. In the last 50 years the world has moved from being 30% urban to 60% urban. 8 million people transition to urban areas every year. As the growing population rises economically, people have a preference to adding protein to their diets and soy is key to that in many ways - feed for hogs, poultry, egg production and aquaculture.

Trade disputes hit agriculture quickly and hard. Cost of inputs go up and market prices for the crop falls. Brazil is the largest competitor to the US in soy production. Brazil is tropical and has available land, but has very little in processing or storage capability. China is investing heavily in Brazil to secure a more reliable soy supplier.


The changing climate is also affecting Iowa growers. Between weather and plant genetics the entire soy calendar has moved up 30 days since Aaron was growing up on a farm in north central Iowa. Aaron shared an aerial photo of the farm where he lived as a boy and described some of the farming practices his father used. In the space of a single generation growing soy beans has gone from a local farmer selling his crop at a local elevator to a business where the operator has to consider: trade policy; world population growth and demographics; climate change; plant genetics; agricultural practices; and competitors and consumers half a world away.
