We were encouraged to take the Rotary International President Ian Riseley seriously in seeking to be innovative in planning our activities. To review, here are some of the recommendations for us to consider as a Club:

- 1) Establish a Membership Committee with a dual focus inviting new members and also nurturing existing members;
- 2) Strive to reach 40% of club membership being women in the next 2 years with a goal of 50-50 within 4-5 years;
- 3) Appoint a task force to begin making plans to celebrate our golden anniversary in October 2018;
- 4) Seek to lower the average age of our members by attracting some younger members:
- 5) Share the quarterly newsletter with other non-Rotarians; 6) Consider giving at a new level to the Rotary Foundation, the "crown jewel, workhorse" of Rotary.

These recommendations are certainly in line with our top goals for this year. Let's *unleash* Rotary and determine to walk *with* Rotary and farm the "Rotary soil" a little deeper than ever before!



October is Polio Month

Here are two more facts about the eradication of Polio that are not commonly known. In Pakistan, the polio program emphasizes hiring local female vaccinators and monitors. More than 21,000 vaccinators, 83 percent of whom are women, are achieving the highest immunization coverage rates in the country's history. Thanks to the efforts of Rotary and its partners, more than 16 million people who otherwise might have been paralyzed are walking today. In all, more than 2.5 billion children have been vaccinated since 1988. We look forward to continuing to do our part in eradicating polio in partnership with the Iowa Wolves basketball on February 3, 2018.

Mike Ruby, District Governor and Wife JoAnne

The October 20, 2017 Northwest Rotary Club members were greeted by Ed Arnold and had the opportunity to meet many guests, including Diana Reed's husband Rick; Ed Arnold's grandson Brock; Leray Glendenning's guest Shawn; past members Eric Dickson and Dave Edgar; Assistant Governor, Chris Bertelson; Past District Governor, Jacque Andrews; and publisher of our District 6000 News Letter, Bill Tubbs.

District Governor Mike Ruby was our honored speaker, inspiring club members engaged in service. He reminded us that Rotary has been planting people since 1905 and our club (Rotary Club of Northwest Des Moines) as been doing it since 1968. He talked to us about there being two types of Rotarians. First, those with a membership mentality: paying their dues, coming for lunch, and greeting each other, being Rotarians for the hour. He also talked about the second type of Rotarian: having a service mentality, living the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self." Telling us, "We can't change the World by just coming to lunch." We need to be active Rotarians. Rotarians in motion, stating that 10% of being a Rotarian takes place during lunch, with 90% occurring outside of lunch, providing warm coats to kids, serving at CFUM, Polio Plus, the Buffalo Bicycles and many other Rotary service projects.

Mike discussed with Club members the three goals of Rotary International President Ian Riseley:

- 1. Report volunteer hours.
- 2. Report money spent on projects in the name of our Club.
- 3. Plant a tree for each of the members of our club.

Mike also laid out to us his three pilots for Rotary 6000:

1. District Newsletter – Every District 6000 member will receive a hard copy delivered to their home, quarterly. Mike encourages us to read the newsletter, have our family members read the newsletter, and when we are finished to pass it along to a local business with a waiting room.

- 2. A Toast to Rotary District 6000 Revamping of the old District 6000 Conference, to be held in five separate locations (Davenport, Ottumwa, Carroll, Coralville, and the location closest to us, West Des Moines, on April 14, 2018 (5:30 PM 9:00 PM), West Des Moines Marriott, 1250 Jordan Creek Parkway.
- 3. World Bicycle Relief (Buffalo Bicycles) These bicycles are more than just a bicycle: for people living in rural regions of developing countries, the bicycles are a path to education, health care, and economic opportunity. Mike offered praise to our Club for taking the unexpected loss of Chuck Corwin and giving our members the opportunity to honor Chuck and do good in the World by donating \$147 in Chuck's name, many times over, to purchase a Buffalo Bicycle.

Mike closed by talking about the Crown Jewel of Rotary -The Rotary Foundation - asking members to consider their Rotary Legacy of doing good in the World beyond our own lifetime by including the Foundation in our estate planning.
