Before digging in, a huge Thank You to Ed for his continued leadership on the Wolves polio fundraiser! Fun night and a good turnout.

Several years ago, while with Deloitte, I spent time with a consultant/coach named Tony Putnam. Tony also happened to be a descriptive psychologist and one of the many things I learned from Tony was the "laziness of questions" (his description) and the art - and benefit - of turning questions into statements. Anyone who has ever been in a job interview can attest to how a conversation is much more enjoyable (and less tiresome) than a Q&A ping-pong session. Those who have worked retail can confirm the grave danger associated with leaning on the "may I help you?" opener.

I was reminded of this concept recently after an exchange at Lifetime Fitness, which began with a standard query. The FY25 Rotary theme I mentioned in last week's newsletter had just been announced and I became curious about the history of our themes; I was interested to see how many themes were posed as questions.

The Rotarian behind the theme concept was Percy Hodgson. Back in 1949, Rotarian Percy constructed an 83-word theme (pins, banners and socks must have been huge back then!) that consisted of a listing of four objectives - and most likely was a key reason that the '56 theme was "Keep Rotary Simple". Some themes attempt to resonate with a Global Call to Action: "Serve to Unite Mankind" ('77) or "Mankind is One – Build Bridges of Friendship Throughout the World" ('82) while others have been a bit more modest in sweep: Be A Friend ('84) or Enjoy Rotary ('86). Interestingly, "Service" didn't find its way into the theme until '77, beginning a run of appearing five of the following eight years.

Not a single theme was posed as a question – one could imagine something like "What can Rotary do for your World?" (or something pithier) would've appeared at some point, especially given the potential for engagement. While I'm not a descriptive psychologist, this little exercise highlights some intriguing patterns in communication and messaging within Rotary's history.

Courtney Davenport Valerius Elementary School Girls Program

Courtney Davenport is a Special Education teacher at Valerius Elementary and heads up their Girls Program. Courtney is a member of the Meskwaki tribe here in Iowa. She brought us information regarding their girls program.

The Chrysalis Foundation has given a grant for a girls program at Valerius Elementary. The program is for girls in the 4th and 5th grade who are more at risk. Most of the girls are from the free and reduced lunch program and come from many ethnicities. The most a program can hold is about 25 students. This past year they had to split the girls into semesters because of the number of girls interested.

The program focuses on social skills, hygiene, friendships, financial literacy and STEM or STEAM programs. The program has been available for the past 3 years. A student will apply to be a part of the program at the beginning of the school year. They meet weekly afterschool so a parent has to be able to provide transportation. Students have a snack, a lesson and then usually a craft. Courntey has been able to get her lesson plans from Teachers Pay Teachers. They have been able to track how successful the program is through surveys. Urbandale middle school also has a similar program.
