The Four-Way Test has stood the test of time as the centerpiece of Rotary's ethical practice. It begins with acknowledging that every interaction must be based on truth. But the admission of the other three tests seeks to qualify that truth alone is not necessarily fair

to all concerned, nor useful in building better friendships, nor is it beneficial to all. Thus our own Rotarian and Membership Chair Ed Arnold is right when he says, "Out of the four tests, the easiest is the first, to tell the truth." I would agree with this when it comes to telling the truth about others. However, when it comes to one's self it is not always so easy to tell yourself the truth about yourself. Often the truth about ourselves eludes us at the deepest levels and thus jeopardizes the fairness, the goodwill and the benefit to others.

Author Parker Palmer provides an example of this very thing. He tells of being offered

the opportunity to become the President of a small educational institution. He was certain the job was for him, but he decided to honor the tradition of the Quaker community, which is to call on a dozen trusted friends to engage in a "clearness committee," a process in which "the group refrains from giving you advice but spends three hours asking you honest, open questions to help you discover your own inner truth." Initially the questions were easy, until someone simply asked, "What would you like most about being a president?" Palmer writes: "The simplicity of that question loosed me from my head and lowered me into my heart." He pondered the question and then began to speak about the things he would not like such as giving up his writing and teaching. Gently but firmly, the inquirer interrupted to remind Palmer that the original question was, "What you would most like?" After several rounds of this litany, he gave an honest answer that came from the bottom of the barrel of his heart . . . an answer that appalled even him. "Well," he said, in

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Bonus Scribe Report

Siobhan Spain Mainframe Studios



Our speaker at the meeting of February 16 was Siobhan Spain, Director of Mainframe Studios. Mainframe Studios is a 160,000 square foot building located at 900 Keosauqua Way (the former Qwest building). It is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization serving as a new national model for providing permanent affordable workspace for artists of all disciplines. The Founder and President is Justin Mandelbaum. The organization opened its doors last October 17, 2017, after 7 years of planning, to unveil three of its five floors, welcoming over 65 artists representing 24 disciplines.

The building will be completed in phases. Phase-1 is complete and includes the lower level, main floor and fourth floor. Second and third floors will be completed one-at-a-time over the next year and a half. Full occupancy is expected in 2019.

Justin Mandelbaum co-founded Western Avenue Studios in Lowell, Massachusetts. This once-vacant mill building complex is now home to the largest artist community on the East Coast. With 250 studios, 50 live/work lofts and over 300 artists, it covers 250,000 square feet. Mainframe Studios is a project of similar scale for Des Moines without a residential component. A demand study was conducted that described a non-profit mission of creating "permanent affordable space for the local arts." The study demonstrated that Des Moines has a robust artist community and that there is a strong demand for permanent affordable workspace.

In addition to the artists' workspaces, Mainframe has a commercial kitchen and meeting/ function area.

Mainframe Studio's self-sustaining business eliminates the need for annual fundraising. Initial fundraising is essential for establishing their vision by supporting building acquisition and renovation costs. Then, the below-market rents are priced to cover operating expenses and a reserve fund, with remaining rental income contributing to an endowment. Rents range from \$175 to \$350 per month.

Mainframe also sponsors an after-hours open house the first Friday of every month. The next event will be this Friday, March 2, from 5 -8 p.m.:
