Early March 2020 - not many want to go back there...but here I go: Exactly four years ago I was at Nourish Now and we, like nearly everyone else in the world, knew something was happening. I remember Governor Hogan's press conferences followed by county leaders trying to decipher what it all would mean. We started to contact restaurants and other organizations in the food industry – cafeterias, casinos, and caterers. No one knew what to expect, and if they had an inkling, they didn't want to face it.

Then March 11 hit, more press conferences with terms such as "essential workers" and "social distancing". The night of March 15 I drove to the Maryland Live casino, which was set to close at 7pm (notwithstanding that, or possibly because of it, all the seats at the blackjack tables were full). I spoke with the food and bevi person about our food recovery program. Others at Nourish Now did the same, and within a few days we were recovering box trucks full of perishable food. Over the next week we received so much that we had to enlist the County, with their personnel and vehicles, to help us store and distribute thousands of pounds of food, very shortly after we received it.

And then, as if the needle had been lifted from the record, the music (and food) stopped. No more cateries catering, no more office cafeteria pickups, grocery stores had empty shelves (think: the toilet paper aisle after a bad weather forecast). At the same time food insecurity was skyrocketing. Because of various types of assistance from the County and other organizations, we were able to set up distribution sites at church and school parking lots and start to help meet the increased need.

The "other organizations" that I mentioned included Rotary. Over the years we had established strong relationships with six local clubs, and because of the members' continued interest and involvement with us, I started dialing. In no time, we had Rotarians volunteering and providing funding, via foundations. I often reflect on that time and how instrumental Rotary was to our mission, which at one stage was providing food to over 15,000 people each week. That's just one of the many reasons I'm proud to be a Rotarian.

# Dr. Jimmy Reyes - Diabetes Mgmt & Familial Project - Nigeria

Jimmy Reyes, Ph.D., DNP, AGNP, RN, FRE: An Assistant Professor of Practice in the Nursing & Public Health department at the University of Northern Iowa, Jimmy Reyes's impact extends beyond the university walls. He is also actively working in Nigeria to counter the rapid increase in Type 2 diabetes. This form of diabetes, also known as adult-onset diabetes, is a chronic condition that affects how the body regulates and utilizes sugar (glucose) as fuel. If left unchecked, it can lead to severe complications such as clogged blood vessels, heart disease, limb amputation, blindness, and kidney damage. Globally, an estimated 780 million people will have diabetes if the current trend continues, disproportionately affecting nations

like Nigeria, which is witnessing significant increases in all types of chronic diseases. The reasons behind this trend include changing demographics, economic challenges, and underserved areas lacking access to medical care.

Dr. Reyes is currently focused on the assessment phase of his project. Both quantitative and qualitative data are being compiled to find solutions tailored to the community being served. The likely solutions to curb diabetes within the community revolve around behavior changes, nutrition, physical activity, and stress management. While these approaches are not new in the fight against diabetes, it is vitally important to engage families and communities effectively to support these efforts. Dr. Reyes leaves us with a poignant quote attributed to Mahatma Gandhi, which guides his life: "You must be the change you want in the world."
