"Rotary is weird. Rotarians are old, mostly. They sing songs and say the Pledge of Allegiance before meetings. They tell lame jokes." Those were the thoughts of 32 year-old Dominick Bonny when he was invited to his first Rotary meeting by 83 year-old Farl

ing by 83 year-old Earl Tilly. But he soon learned that Rotarians also organize highway trash cleanups, blood drives, and literacy fairs, raise money for students to study abroad, and open their homes to foreign students studying here. He was further impressed by their fixation on eradicating polio. Though Dominick did not see a lot of faces his age, he could not escape the higher value of the Rotary mindset of Service Above Self and began to feel at home.

As the manager of a social media and marketing company Dominick's job is to monitor comments from the public which, as he describes it, put his "in a quagmire of social media where people say awful, malicious things." Dominick found a refreshing opportunity to unplug from that and find in Rotary a neutral space where he could

gather with other people with different perspectives and focus on what really matters – making the world a better place.

Dominick recalls that there were early challenges when he first joined Rotary. He went through a period when he first joined. He tired to update the social media and build a new website for the club hoping to gain the interest of his peers. It was slow going but Dominick stuck to his commitment. Eventually is all paid off both from him and the club. Dominick is proud to say that his club is now almost half younger people and their lunch meetings now have a "bit of urgency since not everyone is retired anymore." Dominick admits that "to most young people, Rotary is old-fashioned. But for me, that's what makes it cool. People in my peer group tend to isolate themselves. We are connected by technology, but not truly connected. Rotary is my antidote to that.' How did this happen? Because Earl Tilly reached out with an invitation to Dominick and refused to believe everything he heard about Millennials. The values of Rotary can transcend the barriers of age! Is there a Millennial in your circle of contacts waiting for your invitation?

Did You Know?

Women In Rotary

Until 1989, the Constitution and Bylaws of Rotary International stated that Rotary club membership was for males only. In 1978 the Rotary Club of Duarte, CA, invited three women to become members. The RI board withdrew the charter of that club for violation of the RI Constitution. The club brought suit against RI claiming a violation of a state civil rights law which prevents discrimination of any form in business establishments or public accommodations. The appeals court and the California Supreme Court supported the Duarte position that Rotary could not remove the club's charter merely for inducting women into the club. The United States Supreme Court upheld the California court indicating that Rotary clubs do have a "business purpose" and are in some ways public-type organizations. This action in 1987 allowed women to become Rotarians in any jurisdiction having similar "public accommodation" statutes.

The RI constitutional change was made at the 1989 Council on Legislation, with a vote to eliminate the "male only" provision for all of Rotary.
