

# Prez Sez



Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary was thirty-seven years old when he founded the first Rotary Club in Chicago. Having founded a successful law practice nine years earlier, Harris began to sense the need for social connection within the professional community.

The first club was organized around the themes of "fellowship and friendship" with three clients and local businessmen. Soon, Harris realized that Rotary needed a greater purpose than fellowship and friendship.

I think it is significant that Rotary was not founded by a group of senior adults, but by flourishing young professionals. Yet, now over a hundred years later, Rotary has faced the challenge of attracting young professionals. In a recent Rotary Weekly, Michael Walstrom, President-elect of the Rotary Club of Downtown Boca Raton, Florida, tells of being asked by district governor, Eric Gordon to put together a program for "YP" (young professionals). He was 38 at the time and two years into his Rotary journey. He began to gather data in his district 6930 and discovered that six percent of the membership was in the "under 40" category. He developed a survey of ten questions designed to get at the

Out of that survey he discovered that the driving factors were in fact similar. Younger members were drawn to Rotary through a friend or business contact. They valued networking for primarily business purposes. Manv indicated that they were interested in developing relationships with community leaders for guidance or mentorship. Though at the top of only about half of participants, service was clearly an important factor. The greatest hurdles for the respondents were not a surprise: time and money.

The consistent factor in studies and surveys are that YP's are waiting for an invitation to engage in Rotary. I would invite you to join me in making an intentional effort to invite a young professional to a Club meeting in the next two months. Review the program schedule to discover which program might be the best in which to invite your young friend or colleague. Risking the wrath of the next sergeant in our Club, might I suggest inviting your young friend on April 21 to hear two young professionals, Martin and Cezi Glendenning, speak on their recent interviews with Syrian Refugees in a project

Mentor Iowa is to provide trained volunteer mentors to abused, neglected, and delinquent children who are under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court. They do this by working in partnership with the children, their families and the community. Their relationship to the judicial system is unique among local groups. Their One-on-One Program matches a volunteer mentor with a Child in Need of Assistance. Mentor Iowa works directly with the Department of Human Services (DHS) in serving the child referred by a Juvenile Court Judge. Their desired outcomes include an ongoing relationship between the child and a caring adult, improvement in school and other activities and interaction among the children. There is a monthly event involving the kids doing "cool stuff," and an annual holiday party. Support for Mentor Iowa is provided by 200 sponsors, an auction in April and a golf outing.

They are looking for volunteers to be mentors. There is a background check of potential mentors, as would be expected for people working with youth. They ask that volunteers be able to spend a minimum of 6 hours per month in contact with their match. Most mentors average weekly contact with their match, either by telephone or getting together in person.
