


Prez Sez

Elizabeth went from an intern to an onsite Ambassador to the Manager of the Market. She oversees a team of 6 people. The

market is part of the Greater DSM Partnership and part of the World Food and Out to Lunch Festivals. There was a small market from 1911-1948. The current market with the Greater DSM partnership started on July 24th 1976 with 15 vendors and 200 shoppers. Phil's produce was one of the original vendors and is still a vendor today. This season is the 49th market season. The market runs May- September 7-12, and October 8-12. She said be there by 7:30, 8:00 at the very latest, or it will be crowded. The prior record was 33,000 attendees, but opening day broke the record having 34,000 shoppers. The record has been broken again with 45,000

The Farmer's Market receives over 400 applications per year. Applicants are reviewed by an external jury of partners, sponsors, and ambassadors. Always looking for new vendors around produce, products and growers but have to meet the criteria of: Is there a need?, Is it unique? This year there are only 50 new vendors. Vendors pay an application fee and a weekly fee for their space. Elizabeth closed with the market has expanded into a Winter Farmer's Market November 17-19 in the Hy-Vee Hall.
