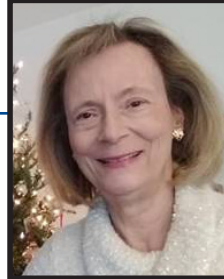

Wendy Blome Spafford
Childrens' Center



The Spafford Children's Center traces its history to 1925. Horatio Spafford, the speaker's great-grandfather, was a Chicago businessman. He suffered some terrible family losses: his four daughters were killed in a maritime disaster; while traveling across the Atlantic to join his wife, who had survived, he wrote the poem that eventually became the hymn, *It Is Well With My Soul*. Then after he and his wife had a new family, his infant son died.

Horatio, his wife and their remaining two daughters relocated to Jerusalem with some other families, and established the American Colony mission, where they provided services to Christians, Moslems and Jews, whoever was in need. They established a lace making and sewing school for women, helped educate girls in an orphanage, and ran soup kitchens and hospitals during World War I. They did not proselytize; they engaged in philanthropic work as part of their Christian faith.

On Christmas Eve of 1925, one of the daughters was asked to help a Bedouin man whose pregnant wife was in distress. Hospital were all closed, so the mission took in the family; the mother died but the child survived, yet the father felt he could not take care of the infant, and so the Mission took in the child; soon other orphans were brought to them for assistance, and the Spafford Baby Home was established. Over time, the Home developed into a 60-bed children's hospital. Following the 1967 war, it converted into an outpatient clinic, also providing preventative medical services.

Today, the Spafford Children's Center (SCC) is located in East Jerusalem, and primarily serves the children of the Palestinian community, who deal with the daily traumas of living in a divided and occupied city. They provide educational, medical, psychological and therapeutic services and resources to the children and their families, in small classes, with never more than three children assigned to one teacher.

COVID-19 had the expected impact on the Center, causing it to be closed for several months, barely and briefly reopened when it had to be closed a second time, then again reopened in February. Online classes were difficult at best, given the need for individualized instruction and the lack of computer

facilities. Things are only now returning to some version of “normal,” post-pandemic.

Even before the pandemic, poverty was on the rise in East Jerusalem and the West Bank. According to a recent United Nations report Palestinians suffer economic isolation and more than 80% of Palestinian children in East Jerusalem live in poverty. Since Wendy has visited Jerusalem regularly for over 45 years and twice a year for 20 years, she has come to know many parents who bring their children to SCC. Some of them, and even their mothers and grandmothers, were “Spafford kids.” These parents want their children to grow up to reach their potential and to be healthy and happy in their lives, just like all parents.

The Rotary Club of East Jerusalem (District 2452) is a supporter of the SCC; one of its members currently serves on the Board and is a past chairman, and the Club holds its meetings at the American Colony Hotel.
