Today's speaker was Jeremy Parsons CEO of the Iowa State fair. Here are some highlights:

The first fair was October 22 through the 25th, 1854 in Fairfield, Iowa, with a budget of \$323.

The current fair annually attracts more than 1 million people from all over the world. It is the largest event in the state. It is one of the oldest and largest agricultural/industrial expositions in the country. It moved to Des Moines in 1879, it's current position.

Some of the fun things to do at the fair include food. There are over 84 food vendors. Many who are small mom and pop businesses. There is lots of free entertainment: people enjoy picking up a spatula at the varied industry building, checking out the butter cow which this is this year is Higgins, Jimmy Fallon, and Johnny Carson on the slide glider, going to the livestock shows and of course, watching to see what or what people are not wearing at the fair.

Many free shows, including horse shows, discounted admission tickets, and more. Jeremy said the admission price of the fair will not be raised this year. This year as a fair goal, there will be more shade, picnic tables and benches.

Lots of free entertainment, including Hairball, horse shows, exhibitions and many more. Grandstand events will feature Lauren Daigle, Jelly roll, Thomas Rhett, Mötley Crüe and many more. Get tickets now because Jelly Roll sold out in 42 minutes.

So much more including competitions and over 50,000 entries in contest such as arm wrestling photography plus many more and of course there's plenty to learn in proud of about Iowa agriculture.
