Kimberly Hansen Rebuilding Together

Our speaker, Kimberly Hansen, the Executive Director of Rebuilding Together ("RT"), led off her presentation by reminding the Club that "...there is always a story behind the door." RT is a mainly volunteer organization that rehabilitates homes of veterans, older adults, individuals with disabilities and lower-income families with dependent children. RT has its origins in Midland, Texas and began in 1995 as 'Christmas in April." While there are 165 chapters throughout the US, RT Des Moines is its own 501(c)3 and raises funds locally to help carry out the mission.

Volunteers, many – but not all - with professional certifications and backgrounds in carpentry, electricity, HVAC and general construction assist with everything from plumbing issues to broken windows, adaptations to increase the safety, security and independence of the living environment for seniors and improving energy efficiency of homes. Kimberly emphasized that "...we love to help families stay in their homes."

In 1995 RT helped rebuild/repair 3 homes in Iowa; this increased to over 250 homes each year just before COVID, and Kimberly attributed this growth primarily to volunteers (more than 300 per year, many with specific credentials and skill sets, as noted above) and to the generosity of the local community (foundations, corporate and individual giving). She also noted that the need for RT's services will only increase given the trends in the national data for low income and aging populations.

The presentation wound up with Kimberly going through a list of ways we can all be involved, including volunteering for a rebuilding day – both as a general volunteer and as a skilled volunteer - making referrals for individuals who may qualify for assistance and/or making a tax-deductible donation. There were plenty of questions, as normal, and Kimberly stayed after the meeting officially ended and continued to chat with us.
