Jake Heston - Juvenile Diabetes Research

Jake Heston, one of our own Club members and a manager of the Urbandale Hy-Vee store presented a program on Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. (JDRF). The Hy-Vee Corporation supports JDRF.



This charitable Foundation focuses on providing funding for Type I Diabetes (T1D). T1D is an auto immune disease which has proven to be primarily genetic in which the pancreas stops producing insulin in the body. T1D affects 1.4 million Americans with 64,000 new cases being diagnosed annually. It is estimated that 2.1 million Americans will have T1D by 2040. In recent years there has been a twenty-one percent increase of TID in young people under the age of twenty. A ten-point test is now available which reveals with increased accuracy the probability of a person having T1D in the future.

TID also can affect vision and it is recommended that a person with T1D have their eyes checked at least once or twice annually.

Scribe Continued...

The Foundation sponsors several bike rides across the country to raise funding and awareness for JDRF. The first bike ride annual was held in Death Valley, California in 1999 with 17 riders. The number of ride locations has increased across the years accumulating over \$60 million for JDRF. 2.2 million was raised and donated to JDRF in 2023.

Funding for the Foundation comes from events such as the bike rides and support from corporations such as Hy-Vee. Over the last twenty years, Hy-Vee has donated over \$22 million to diabetes research. In addition, an entity known the Children's Congress lobbies legislators in Washington, DC for additional funding.

The Foundation funds are distributed in several of the following ways: continued research for a cure for diabetes which to date has totaled 2.5 billion; care packages developed for families of children when they are first diagnosed with T1D; advocacy for fair and consistent pricing of insulin and new technology for the care of diabetes patients. One such technology in recent years has been the development of equipment which can detect high blood sugar through a smart phone. This type of technology has great increased the mobility of TID patients.

The work of the Juvenile Diabetes Research foundation continues to provide tremendous hope that one day soon diabetes, especially Type I diabetes, will be cured. This reality will significantly change the lives of millions of Americans who suffer from this disease.
