After some Facetimes and emails over the summer I finally met our student, Juan Toledano-Roman, last Sunday evening in the Des Moines airport. Juan was born and raised in Vigo, Spain, which is in the far northwestern section of the country, in the autonomous region of Galicia, not far from Santiago de Compostela, the ultimate destination of El Camino.

Juan's older brother Yago just spent his junior year on a Rotary Youth Exchange in Cincinnati and enjoyed it so much that it motivated Juan to sign up. Juan just spent his first few days as a junior at Roosevelt, has already attended a high school (American) football game and his first soccer practice is on Monday. He is interested in architecture, enjoys math and is excited to join the soccer and basketball teams at school. In addition to being inspired by his brother's experience, he's looking to make friends, learn about another culture – he's already discovered that I eat dinner a bit earlier than 11 pm – and, in accord with our Fifth pillar of the Four Way Test, have fun. Emily Easton - Four Oaks Family Connection

Emily Easton provided an informative program about recruiting and retaining stable, nurturing, and diverse foster and adoptive parents to provide safe home for children, keeping them from further trauma and assisting their transformation to permanency. Four Oaks covers the Eastern two thirds of Iowa, helping to connect foster and adoptive parents with the training and licensing services and support to assist on fostering and adoption journeys. Four Oaks also provides Community-based services to allow children to remain safely in their home, preventing the need for follow up treatment and puts at risk children and families back on the track to success. There are more than 1,000 foster parents in the Polk County area, and more are needed. Four Oaks works closely with the Department of Human Services to provide safe temporary and permanent homes for children. They also provide proactive services for
