The cost and nature of dinner was debated (apparently yet again).

So many similarities to our and many other clubs - although their outing in February, a trip to the Palazzo de Grazia in Venice for a Carnival Ball might not be something we get booked this year – once again conveyed the international reach combined with local flavor that is Rotary. I did not bring our club banner, which means I'll be forced to attend again next year for the exchange. And I'm already counting the days!

Leo Landis - Iowa's Emancipation Events

Leo Landis State Curator for The State Historical Society of Iowa presented a fascinating overview of the history of emancipation celebrations in Iowa.

Early celebrations were held prior to the Civil War recognizing the end of slavery in the British West Indies. August 1, 1833 marked the day when slaves were freed in those islands, thus August 1st was often celebrated. Earliest reports of celebrations in Iowa were from 1856.

More often the celebrations were held commemorating the signing of the Preliminary Emancipation Proclamation (September 22, 1862) or the enactment of the Emancipation Proclamation (January 1, 1863).

Celebrations occurred in at least 30 communities around Iowa. The African Methodist Episcopal and Baptist Churches usually organized the day's events. Features of the commemoration often included a parade, concert, reading of the Emancipation Proclamation, religious service, feasting, speeches, and educational programs. Events were hosted by the African American citizens, however, attendees came from all races

These celebrations continued into the 1920's, then began to taper off as freed former slave numbers were dwindling in the population. A few of the celebrations persisted into the 1940's and 1950's.

Mr. Landis also noted that Iowa recognized universal male suffrage with a constitutional amendment in 1868 and an Iowa Supreme Court decision desegregated Iowa schools that same year. Iowa has a long, rich history on our continuing journey towards equality among all citizens.


