Ed Arnold Polio Eradication Update

President Bill D. Corwin welcomed about 15 "Zoom" attendees. Beth Goedken gave a nice invocation, followed by Jim Arthur's Sergeant session. We found out how much/little we know about Taiwan and the 2021 Rotary International Convention.



Our default speaker, Ed Arnold, provided an update on Polio Eradication efforts since the Global Polio Eradication Initiative was started in 1985 by a collaboration of RI, World Health Organization, Centers for Disease Control and the United Nations. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation joined the effort in the early 2000's, eventually providing about 16% of the \$17 Billion expended so far. Ten billion doses have been administered to over 3.3 billion children. In 1985 there were 350,000 new cases per year, eventually being reduced to only 22 in 2017. There were 176 new cases in 2019; so far in 2020 we are at 138, 56 in Afghanistan and 82 in Pakistan. Of the three types of polio, types 2 (1999) and 3 (2019) have been declared "eradicated," leaving only type 1.

In April, 2016 the vaccine administered was switched from trivalent to bivalent, which includes only the type 1 and 3 serotypes. It is estimated that 90% of the circulating vaccine derived Polio Virus type 2 (cVDPV2) was/is caused by the trivalent vaccine. Going

forward, eradication efforts are being concentrated on Key At Risk Countries (5 of them, mostly Asian), Outbreak Countries (mostly African), previously polio free, but have experienced reintroduction of wild or circulating virus from another country, and Endemic countries (Afghanistan and Pakistan).

Locally, the partnership with the Iowa Energy, now Iowa Wolves basketball club has raised over \$129,000 in the past 12 years, enough to immunize over 250,000 children. A statue recognizing the eradication effort was placed in the A.H. Blank Children's hospital grounds to recognize the early efforts to care for polio patients in 1943. District 6000 will be sponsoring a virtual bike ride in the Spring to raise funds. In addition, PDG John Ockenfels will be taking off on his COVID-19 delayed flight around the world, to promote awareness of the Polio eradication efforts. Rotary Club of Northwest Des Moines continues to be a leader in per capita giving among District 6000 clubs.

Through this pandemic the worst part has been not seeing family. We haven't seen son Scott, in Minnesota, for well over a year. We've been with some of our Iowa family only on rare occasions, practicing "social distancing." Thanksgiving would usually have been a gathering with our daughter and family near Humboldt. Instead we did manage to get all the clan together for a Zoom call!

With the recent upsurge we have returned to being hermits, although we go shopping for necessities on occasion. This year has served as a vivid reminder that we are fundamentally "social animals," and that we crave even limited interaction with family and friends. Let's hope that craving is soon satisfied for all of us!
