Rotary in Haiti Update:

To date, Rotary has delivered more than 100 plane loads and numerous containers of medical supplies, food, water, toys, clothes, bedding and tents. Many volunteer doctors, surgeons and nurses have also been transported by Rotary. The new focus will be in three areas: 1)The children are considered a priority and they must get back to school. In addition to literacy, this ensures one meal a day and keeps them occupied. 2)It is estimated that about 4,000 individuals have had amputations and require prosthetics. D7020 has appointed a committee to coordinate the efforts

locally with the numerous organizations interested in helping to provide prosthetics 3)With 1.2 million now homeless, living in tents or under various types of material and the rainy/hurricane season approaching, sustainable housing must be addressed. D7020 has appointed a committee to investigate various types of appropriate ways to provide shelter that can withstand hurricanes and earthquakes.

Peggy Aguilar Habitat for Humanity

Peggy Aguilar is a woman who loves her job. She said it is amazing what happens when people of different cultures and faiths come together working for a common cause. She works at Habitat for Humanity and has had the chance to see families lives change.

Habitat for Humanity is a nonprofit Christian ministry founded on the conviction that every man, woman and child should have a decent, safe and affordable place to live.

Habitat is not a giveaway program. In addition to a down payment and monthly mortgage payments, homeowners invest hundreds of hours of sweat equity into building their habitat house and the houses of others.

Families wanting to partner with the Greater Des Moines Habitat for Humanity must meet the following criteria:

- 1.) They must have need living in substandard housing or no housing at all
- 2.) They must be willing to volunteer 400 hours of sweat equity
- 3.) They are able to repay an interest free mortgage over 20 years.

Peggy said Habitat does not charge interest on its mortgages or profit from them. Mortgage payments go directly into a trust to build more homes. To date no Habitat home has met with foreclosure.

She encouraged us to if we have spare time to volunteer. She said that in September Habitat for Humanity will build 10 houses in 20 days. If you are interested check out their website wwwgdmhabitat.org.

HOST an Earth Day fair. **START** a community vegetable garden.


SPONSOR a creative recycling contest. **HOLD** a giant community rummage sale.
