Scribbles Renee Von Brokem Animal Rescue League

The Animal Rescue league of central Iowa was started in 1926. It is an open access shelter where no animal of any type is turned away. In 1986 the current shelter was built to house up to 300 animals (mainly dogs). They are currently building a new shelter as they have outgrown their space at the main location despite opening satellite shelters throughout the metro area.

Besides housing and adopting out over 18,000 animals yearly, the rescue league works on 7 main projects:

Humane Education: education on pet care, responsibility, overpopulation, bite prevention, education programs in schools, and political action regarding animal's rights. Behavioral Counseling: obedience classes, puppy kindergarten, pet manners classes Temporary Love and Care Program: People in the community provide temporary care to animals that need medical recovery, weight gain, and socialization so an animal may eventually be adoptable.

Cruelty Intervention: Rescuing animals from abuse/neglect situations. Fifty percent of the animals involve horses.

PAWS: Pets And Women Succeedinginmates from the Mitchellville prison teach dog training basics to animals in their care.

WHISKERS: Inmates working with cats/kittens.

WHINNY: Just getting started for abused and neglected horses.

Animals may be adopted starting at \$105 which includes spay/neuter, first vaccinations, microchip, collar, and ID tag. There are many volunteer opportunities available to work with the animals.

Rotary Minute...

Rotary's Wheel Emblem

A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "civilization and movement." Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads . In 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should

adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus in 1923, the present gearwheel with

24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by Rotary International. A group of engineers advised that the gearwheel was mechanical unsound and would not work without a "keyway" in the center of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, the keyway was added, and the design that we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary emblem.
