This past week NW Des Moines Rotary club has had the opportunity to serve our community in 2 ways. Saturday August 20th several of our members sold root beer floats at the Hy-Vee on 86th and Douglas. The ice cream and root beer is donated so that all proceeds go to the Iowa Special Olympics. This is a community event that we have been supporting since 1994. Rob DensonPresident - DMACC

Rob Denson became President of DMACC in 2003. He is the fourth President of DMACC and the first President who is an Iowa native.

DMACC began its first classes in 1967. There were 295 students enrolled for one of the 15 programs. The school at that time was located at 2020 Grand in West Des Moines.

Today their main campus is in Ankeny. DMACC is also in Newton, Boone, Des Moines, West Des Moines, and Perry. In the future DMACC is looking to expand to other central Iowa locations such as Knoxville and Pella. In 2010 at DMACC's 6 locations they served 24,658 students.

Eighty percent of jobs in central Iowa require more than a high school diploma. DMACC is working to help the student receive the accreditation to get a good job. DMACC now has more than 130



programs and certifications. DMACC also works closely with 4-year schools so DMACC students can easily transfer to complete a 4-year degree.

Here is a little tidbit from Wikipedia: for an Iowa resident, the DMACC per-credit rate is approximately \$125.00. For an Iowa resident at ISU the per credit rate range is \$232.00-\$286.00.

Are You Prepared for a Disaster???

- 1. Disaster personnel & rescue workers may reach you in only a few hours or it may take days. It is important to keep a sufficient amount of supplies to last you at least 3 days.
- 2. Basic services may be suspended: During disasters basic services like water, telephones, gas, electricity and sewerage may be cut out for days or even weeks.
- 3. Evacuation: You may be ordered to evacuate at a moments notice. Having basic supplies at arms reach will be invaluable to you as you will likely be unable to shop for these necessities once a disaster strikes.

Disaster Supply kit Essentials:

Water, food, first aid kit, basic equipment & tools and items for people with special needs (infants and the infirm).

Do I need to have additional kits:

It's a good idea to keep a similar kit in your car & at work as you never know when or where a disaster is likely to strike?

Work: food, water and a pair of comfortable walking shoes.

Car: food, water, first-aid kit, jumper cables and flares.

How to store and maintain your kit:

Keep kit in a cool dry place. Make your kit portable by storing it in a backpack
