Historic celebration in Birmingham



Be a part of history when Birmingham, England, hosts the 100th Rotary International Convention, June 21-24, 2009, at the National Exhibition Centre, Europe's busiest exhibition hall.

Rotarians will celebrate the possibilities of Rotary on a grand scale, with inspirational plenary sessions and informative breakout sessions showcasing how Rotary makes dreams real for children the world over.

Birmingham is a modern, pedestrian friendly city that still retains traces of its medieval and Industrial Revolution-era roots. With more canals than Venice, Birmingham offers 35 miles of waterways for boat rides. Convention goers can choose from a variety of international cuisines, in addition to traditional pub fare, such as shepherd's pie.

British Rotarian hosts are planning a series of special events, including a kickoff parade, an evening concert and fireworks in Cannon Hill Park, and exclusive access to Warwick Castle, one of the world's best-preserved medieval castles. Nestled in the West Midlands, Birmingham is an ideal starting point to explore the Cotswolds, home to Oxford University and Shakespeare's birthplace, Stratford-upon-Avon. London is a 90-minute train ride away. Wales, Scotland, and Ireland are also easily accessible, as are such European capitals as Paris, Madrid, and Lisbon.

Birmingham will prove to be one of the most accessible conventions in recent memory, with both the convention venue and major hotels just minutes from the airport.

Sharon and I are already registered for Birmingham. Several other couples from our Bullhead City Rotary Club are also seriously considering attending this convention in England. Why not plan on joining us?

Saving the children by Art Harrington



Overcoming child mortality

- a high priority this year

RI President-elect Dong Kurn Lee has motivated Rotarians to take action in decreasing the world's child mortality rate. "More than 26,000 children die each day from preventable diseases such as pneumonia, measles, and malaria," he said.

One of the greatest challenges is that there simply are not nearly enough doctors to go around in many parts of the world. Mozambique has 3 doctors for every 100,000 people, and mortality rates are high for both newborns and women giving birth.

Admirably, midwives and other women in Mozambique are being trained to perform Caesarean sections and other types of surgery to counteract a severe shortage of doctors. As the result of receiving this training, they are saving the lives of a great numbner of children and women.

In 2004 the Mozambique government initiated a program to train a group of women - some already nurses or midwives, some with only a high school education - to perform Caesareans, hysterectomies and other operations.

While they may be the world's most unlikely obstetricians, these young women who are defying traditional medical training and cultural barriers, are convincingly beating the odds in their country by preventing the deaths of women and children at childbirth.

Rotary is involved, as usual, and is encouraging Rotarians around the world to support such efforts, as well as to find other

such innovative solutions to help overcome child mortality.

As President D.K Lee has said, "Our job is a simple one. It is saving lives with our hearts and our minds and our souls. And if in 2008-09 every one of us does this job well, at the end of the year we will all have achieved something wonderful."

River fun this weekend by Art Harrington

Ye gotta Regatta!

Thousands of water enthusiasts are expected to participate in the colorful and popular "Pirates of the Colorado River Regatta" here in Bullhead City this Saturday. Any pirate-decorated device that will stay afloat from inner tubes to canoes, including kayaks and all other non-motorized floats, will be accepted in the competition this weekend. Organized last year by the City of Bullhead City, this year the Laughlin's casino resorts have hopped on board to help sponsor this event that is clearly a winner.

"We watched Bullhead City put together this great event last year, and we could see the tremendous potential for growth," said Laughlin Tourism President Sean Hammond. "We believe Laughlin's visitors are going to love getting out on the river and having some fun, so the resorts are very happy to partner with Bullhead City to make this event rock the river!"

"Pirates" will sail off at 9 am at the Bullhead Community Park on Highway 95 (just across from Harrah's Laughlin) and race down the river to Rotary Park. In 2007, more than 900 floaters participated. This year, pre-registration numbers are indicating 2,500 or more floaters will participate in the floating party. All vessels must be out of the water by 2:50 p.m. on the day of the event and be ready for the awards ceremony which will be held immediately following the competition at 3 p.m. Participants had to register by August 4. Kayaks and canoes are planning to join the fun and race a longer course from Davis Dam to Rotary Park.

Murphy Broadcasting, also a major sponsor of the Regatta, will be providing music, broadcasting from pontoon boats along the float route.

To get everyone in the spirit, a "Ye Gotta Regatta" pre-welcome reception will be held on Friday at Community Park from 5-10 p.m., with vendors, costume contests, scavenger hunts and dancing. Participants can get their inner tubes aired up, judge in the "Best Bartender in the Tri-State" contest and purchase pirate souvenirs. There will also be a scavenger hunt for children.

Saturday morning's events will start with the kayak race from Davis Camp. The inner tube

float will follow. There will be three launching points to choose from: Laughlin's Fisherman's Access Park, the beach at Harrah'sLaughlin and Bullhead City's Community Park.
