### **Rotary's Ambassadors**

I told the story in last week's article of former Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar Steve Hollingsworth, who is now the Director of CARE India. It is an amazing story of an incredible return on our Rotary Foundation dollars invested in a promising young leader.

I mentioned there have been thousands of such investments we have made in these Rotary Scholars over the years, with many of them going on to become distinguished and influential leaders in international business, professional, political and humanitarian endeavors.

Do you have any idea *how* many of them there have been? Since we began the program in 1947, there have been nearly 40,000 Rotary Scholars from 110 different countries. We have invested nearly \$500 million in these gifted and promising young educational ambassadors.

In 2002 we launched a new 2-year Rotary World Peace Fellows scholarship program, leading to a masters degree in Peace & Conflict Resolution at one of 7 Rotary Peace Centers worldwide. These centers were established at a select group of major universities, offering a specialized curriculum in this field of studies. Since its inception, we have already graduated 180 World Peace Fellows from 50 different countries.

I have met and listened to a number of these graduates. They are truly impressive young leaders. Many are already occupying influential positions with both governmental and nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) around the world.

How impressive are they? One of my long-time, valued Rotary friends and his wife here in Arizona are so impressed with this program and its product that they have endowed a chair at one of these Rotary Peace Centers with a contribution of one million dollars.

Through such investments in these potential world leaders Rotary continues to emerge as one of the major forces in the world committed to the quest for global peace.

Next week we will begin looking at some of these graduates, our Rotary World Peace Fellows, and see what they are already doing.
