

D K Lee's emphasis is on reducing child mortality rate

Rotary International President-elect Dong Kurn Lee said he was in disbelief when he learned that 30,000 children under the age of five die every day from preventable diseases such as pneumonia, diarrhea, measles, and malaria.

Once I understood the issues behind that terrible number, I knew what I needed to do," Lee said. He told the incoming governors that Rotary will keep the service emphases of recent years - water, health and hunger, and literacy - but asked them to focus their efforts in each of these areas on children.

Speaking to the District Governors-Elect from around the Rotary world, Lee said, "In 2008-09, I will ask you all to *Make Dreams Real* for the world's children. This will be our theme, and my challenge to all of you."

Earthquakes & eruptions in Rotary World by Art Harrington



The Rotary International Board of Directors overwhelmingly approved the proposed plan to re-zone the Rotary World at its meeting in Evanston last week.

With Rotary being a representative organization, when it experiences membership population shifts, the organization (like our nation with its House of Representatives) must be restructured to assure the required equitable representation of all of its members. The fact is that Rotary membership in the U.S. has declined over the past decade, while Rotary in places like Korea and India has experienced considerable growth. The governing documents of Rotary require the RI Board to review Rotary's worldwide representation, and to restructure the Rotary World, if needed, every 8

years.

The bottom line is that Rotary in North America is losing the equivalent of one entire zone, and Asia is gaining a zone. So new zone boundaries and constituent districts are having to be created here in the U.S..

How does that affect us here in Arizona? Our three Rotary Districts, which have been a part of Zone 25 (the huge heartland of America), are being shifted over to join Nevada, California and Hawaii in Zone 24. At least we are all going over there together. The word is that Texas is being sliced up three-ways. (What was it that we heard from those Texas Longhorns recently about "Don't Mess With Texas"? We're not sure if those are smoke signals or what that have been rising recently over there on the eastern horizon.)

Wheelchair Challenge by Art Harrington

A Unique Rotary GSE for 2008-09

Our district is planning to do a wheelchair-bound team exchange in 2009 with Rotary District 9680 in Australia. Our team would be outbound to Australia April 27 - May 18, 2009. Due to the complexity of this exchange, the team leader and team members are being chosen within the next couple of months for this exchange.

A dream of our DGE Charlie Tegarden, the goal is to focus upon the abilities of the team members, rather than their disabilities, and to demonstrate that participation by wheelchair-bound individuals is possible on such GSE exchanges. It is hoped this exchange will enrich the lives of the Rotarian hosts through the formation of personal friendships with team members, and will help build bridges of knowledge, understanding, tolerance and sensitivity with wheelchair users.

The team leader (a Rotarian) and four non-Rotarian team members, between the ages of 25 - 40, must all be permanent wheelchair users. Wheelchairs will not be motorized or electronically controlled, but will be manually operated on this trip.

Help is needed to identify potential candidates for team leader and team members. It is hoped that interviews for team leader can be held in late February or early March, with those for team members to follow after that.
