

#### **How does BC Rotary Rank?**

Our club membership now stands at 48 - down from where we were a year ago - and certainly not as large as we intend to be by the end of this Rotary year, according to Membership Chair, Randy Turner. We need to concentrate this year on bringing in more quality members to assist us in serving our community.

Where do we stand, though, in comparison with other Rotary Clubs around the world? According to a study based on 30,062 clubs, not including clubs in Great Britain or Ireland, here are the club size comparisons:

40% - have 25 or less members

40% - have 26-50 members

13% - have 51-75 members

4% - have 76-100 members

1% - have 101-125 members

1% - have 126-151 members

1% - have 151 or more members

# Peace Fellow's frontline work benefits three countries

Rotary World Peace Fellow Izabela Pereira worked for conflict resolution in three countries before she even graduated from the fellowships program. Through the Rotary Center for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution at Argentina's Universidad del Salvador, Pereira helped monitor Nicaragua's November election as part of an Organization of American States (OAS) mission to that country.

"Democracy and peace in Nicaragua are like a crystal cup: expensive, fragile, and highly sought after," says Pereira, whose 2005-07 fellowship was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Brasilia-5 de Dezembro, Distrito Federal, Brazil. Pereira saw peace at work in the two drivers assigned to guide her group to voting sites. Once combatants on opposite sides of Nicaragua's civil war, the two now freely talked to each other.

"Both concluded that the war made no sense," Pereira says. "They were killing their own brothers. In a cruel irony of history, they demanded the same rights and denounced the same injustices." Pereira says her experience as an OAS observer gave her a firsthand understanding of how democracy is being promoted and strengthened in Nicaragua. "It was an honor to participate in this historical moment of a nation, where the Nicaraguan people build their democracy in the wake of many civil wars and shocking poverty."

In Senegal, Pereira explored strategies for averting violence against women and preventing conflict during three months of fieldwork with the United Nations Development Fund for Women. She also observed the country's presidential election in February. In Cte d'Ivoire, she suggested methods for coordinating the efforts of women's organizations to build peace.

How would Pereira like to apply what she's learned as a Rotary World Peace Fellow? "My particular interests are strengthening democracy, public policy strategies, and sustainable development in postconflict societies," she says. "I would like to work for a global organization like the UN, OAS, or International Committee of the Red Cross."
