Log on to savings and support The Rotary Foundation



Rotarians can shop and benefit The Rotary Foundation all at once just by visiting the RI Web site. Every time Rotarians in participating areas of the world use their Rotary International MasterCard or American Express (United States only), a portion of the purchase amount benefits the Foundation.

Since the program was launched in 2000, the Foundation has received more than US\$5 million.

Rotarians in Canada, the United Kingdom, and the United States can enjoy savings with over 1,000 quality merchants through a partnership between Rotary International and the online shopping mall CareClicks.com. Started in 2005, the program is similar to the affinity credit card program in that a percentage of each purchase goes to the Foundation. Official Rotary sponsors that also offer discounts to Rotarians include Avis, Berlitz, BlackBerry, Budget, and VoiceStick.

"Rotarians aren't being asked to make a sacrifice to participate in these programs," says Robert Mintz, manager of the RI Corporate Relations and Global Travel Division. "They receive a discount in the prices of goods and services, and a portion of what they spend goes to The Rotary Foundation."

Since November 2006, U.S. Rotarians have also been able to contribute to the Foundation by selling items on eBay. Through the company's charitable arm, MissionFish, sellers can choose to have the Foundation receive all or part of an auction's proceeds. "Sometimes, people might not have liquid assets to give but still want to donate to the Foundation," says Christine Johnson, of the Foundation's Planned and Major Gifts Department. "Mission-Fish gives them the opportunity and provides a tax receipt."
