RI Convention Vibes



Greetings from the 99th Annual Rotary International Convention in Los Angeles! Being the entertainment capital of the world, the caliber of the performers and performances in conjunction with the main sessions is superlative. From the Canadian Brass and All American Boys Choir highlighting the opening ceremonies on Sunday, to the Pasadena Pops and David Gaines (Phantom of the Opera) featured at the closing ceremony on Wednesday evening, Rotarians from around the world are enjoying some of the best.

However, as great as the entertainment may be, by far the greatest aspect of any Rotary Convention is Rotary itself - seeing and hearing about Rotary's incredible global accomplishments, and experiencing first-hand the incomparable international fellowship of Rotary.

The House of Friendship, "where the Rotary World comes together" is the largest and most diverse ever, with 375,000 square feet, representing five continents with over 300 booths, and two entertainment stages (one that totally features Rotarians). In many ways, though, this House of Friendship is spilling out onto the streets and restaurants of LA. Rotarians are everywhere; and wherever you encounter a member of the Family of Rotary you find a friendly, welcoming smile and a willingness to visit, share and compare Rotary experiences.

The official commemorative project of the LA2008 Convention is Rotary's Wide World of Books. Every Rotarian attending is being asked to donate one or more books that will be presented to public elementary schools in Southern California and Nevada. It is expected to be the largest international book drive ever, putting Rotary in the Guinness Book of World Records.

While there are always a wide variety of breakout sessions each afternoon featuring presentations, panels, workshops and interactive discussion groups on every conceivable Rotary subject, I find the greatest inspiration in each convention comes

from the outstanding Plenary Sessions held each morning. These general sessions are featuring this year such notable speakers as William Asiko, President of the Coca-Cola Africa Foundation at the Coca-Cola Company, Dr, Margaret Chan, director-general of the World Health Organization, Dr. Julie Gerberding, director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Anne Veneman, director of UNICEF, and Michael Josephson, one of the most respected ethicists in the United States.

Most impressive, though, over the past seven years this group has managed to raise over \$160,000 for The Rotary Foundation and other charities. In addition, they have contributed to a revival of interest in music in the public schools of Grand Junction, along with introducing Rotary's 4-Way Test in a toe-tapping musical package to the kids in those schools.

Wherever they go, they are a huge hit with Rotary audiences. We are looking forward to their highlighting our own district conference next Spring.
