Caribbean report by Art Harrington

An awesome experience

In spite of my best intentions, I was unable to transmit a club bulletin to you last week. I



discovered, upon our arrival at our destination in Nassau, Bahamas, that we had no internet connection. Given our schedule, which kept us going from early morning until late at night for the entire week, I'm not sure when I would have found the time or energy to put the issue together anyway.

It was our great privilege to serve as the personal representatives of RI President Wilf Wilkinson and his wife Joan at the first joint district conference of Rotary Districts 7020 and 6930. Representatives from eleven countries and four territories comprised the **1,100** who attending this joint conference - including 118 from Haiti and 180 members of Rotaract Clubs (Rotary for those 18-30 years of age).

Held at the world-famous Atlantis Resort on Paradise Island, one cannot begin to imagine a finer or more beautiful setting for such an incredible Rotary gathering. We had arrived early for the conference, in order to assist with the PETS and Assembly for club leadership training that always precedes the conference for D7020. With such geographical expanses between the island nations represented in that district, it is cost-prohibitive to train club leaders on the recommended Rotary schedule. So they come early to do it all at once.

I mentioned the Rotaract Clubs in D7020. There are 35 of them, and they have their own District Rotaract Governor. They held a concurrent Rotaract District Conference with that of Rotary. Then on Saturday afternoon these Rotaractors led the way in a joint service project that dramatically transformed a neglected and unsightly section of the harbor waterfront in Nassau into a beautiful and functional public park. In the photo, I am meeting with some these energetic Rotaract workers who led in that remarkable project.

District 7020 sponsored three Group Study Exchanges this Rotary year - each from different island nations within that district. Completely coincidentally, the GSE Team from The Bahamas is the one being exchanged with our own District 5490. We will be hosting them here next week in Bullhead City. Consequently, Sharon and I had the opportunity to meet this exciting team and their leader last Saturday, just before they had to leave to catch their flight to Arizona.

Fascinated with the environment, she conducts an after-school environmental program. She and her students have worked on beach cleanups, birding counts and artificial reef construction. She also writes for the island newspaper.
