Meet Francesa Giovannini

Rotary World Peace Fellow from Italy



Over the last five years, Francesca has served in many international organizations in the Arab Region. In 2000, she served in the Gaza Strip (Rafah) as project coordinator, for a joint-initiative of the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Network of Italian NGO's. She then worked for "Un Ponte per." an Italian NGO, as Desk Officer for projects in Turkey and Lebanon undertaking missions in the field to monitor and evaluate the implementation of humanitarian projects. In October 2002, Francesca was selected by UNDP and appointed as UN Coordination Analyst in Beirut to support and facilitate aid-coordination among UN Agencies.

At our Rotary World Peace Center at UC Berkeley Francesca is exploring the root-causes of major conflicts in the Arab Region, the flourishing of Islamic political movements, and the major threats posed by Islamic Fundamentalism to international security.

After the completion of her Master's program, she would like to go back to the UN as a political advisor for the Middle East. Francesca graduated from the Faculty of Political Sciences in Bologna and continued her studies in Rome with a post-university degree at SPICeS, School of Foreign Affairs, Cooperation and Development. This program offered a variety of lectures mainly on Humanitarian Affairs, Development, and Aid Coordination. In June 2004, while she was already working at the United Nations Development Program Office in Beirut, Francesca attended the summer school in Oslo on Peace Studies.
