Our fight against polio

Advocacy paying off in India's polio fight



If strong gains continue against polio in Uttar Pradesh, the northern Indian state may not have to bear the stigma of being the poliovirus capital of the world much longer. In 2007, India's most populous state not only accounted for almost 40 percent of the country's 864 polio cases but also more than a quarter of all cases worldwide. Eighty percent of Uttar Pradesh's 339 cases that year occurred in the Muslim community.

But a Rotary-led initiative helped drop that rate to 16 percent of 48 cases during the first four and a half months of 2008. Overseeing Uttar Pradesh's effort to end the disease is the Ulema Committee for Polio Eradication, established by Rotary International in 2007. (Ulemas are leading Muslim experts in Islamic law.) The group has distributed a booklet published by the India PolioPlus Committee to Muslim clerics and school representatives that links polio immunization to the duties of parents as explained in the Quran.

Ulema Committee members have also visited districts in Uttar Pradesh with large numbers of polio cases to convince parents that the vaccine is safe and consistent with Islam. "When we went to the slums, Rotary went with us. Rotary tried to understand the background of the resistance," says Nita Chowdhury, principle health secretary of Uttar Pradesh, explaining that Rotarians worked with other nongovernmental organizations to create an advocacy plan for the area.

"Rotary is able to do this work because of the conviction people feel flowing from their actions," she said.

Included in our dues

Each Rotary club handles its finances differently. With our club, we do not separate out meals from dues. There is one set amount each member pays guarterly, which includes the member's meals at

club meetings.

From those billed amounts are paid the per capita dues to Rotary International and to our Rotary district, along with an amount for each member's subscription to *The Rotarian* magazine and the premiums for the insurance each Rotary club is required to carry. In addition, club supplies, required leadership training and the additional expense of a couple special events during the year are covered in those club dues.

What happens to the meals money saved when members do not attend a meeting? That's all calculated into the budget to help pay the cost of our guest speakers' meals, as well as our being able to host those wonderful Interact Club representatives we invite to our meetings each week.
