Listening to the "A Chat with your Baby" DVD last Thursday, and the ensuing discussion over the merits of this "Begin with the Children"

intervention pilot project, I could not help but think back to the many situations I have dealt with over the years, when this message never got through to parents.

I have worked closely with children and youth over most of my lifetime, counseling, teaching, challenging and trying to guide them. The words of one young boy will forever haunt my memory. At 9 years of age, he was on his way toward becoming a career criminal. Assigned as his "Big Brother," I had a heart-to-heart talk with him one day about what he felt had gone wrong. "My mother never loved me enough to tell me 'No,' he replied." With no boundaries or guidelines, he had continually been in trouble with the law, even by that age.

I think of another large family in this community I have worked with. The older adolescent girls have necessarily had to assume the roles of the absentee parents for their younger siblings. Somehow these parents never got the message that some essential things would be needed from them to responsibly raise these children they brought into the world. They are too busy partying, doing drugs and getting into trouble with the law to raise their children.

It just never happened for these parents. Apparently that "Magic Moment" for communicating the essential message to them got missed, and now they are too messed up to care. Sadly, it is always the kids that suffer, as they do without, and are moved from pillar to post, following eviction upon eviction.

Will it work to intercept these parents with this DVD and a Parenting Kit at that "Magic Moment" in a birthing hospital? Our club seems to feel it's worth a try.

While she is still being tube fed, since she cannot swallow, Phil says Lydia has a strong grip and can shake her feet, cross her legs and unfasten and remove her sneakers. She cannot walk yet, but she is working on that.

Relating a moving experience with the scarf that Kathleen gave to her, Dr. Phil confidently says that Lydia "is cognitively clicking on all cylinders already, and this will surely help with her psychomotor re-development process."

He also says, "Rotarians in Taiwan and Lydia's family are truly

grateful for all that Rotarians in Arizona and Nevada have done to support Lydia's reunification with her family and her recovery process."

Helping the most needy in Haiti

My friend, PDG Richard McCombe (Nassau, Bahamas), on Oct. 3-4 flew to Haiti to tour the

areas hardest hit by the hurricanes & flooding with members of the Rotary Haiti Task Force that has been responsible for distributing the help Rotarians from around the world have sent.

Dick reports, "...it confirmed my highest expectations of the integrity and commitment of the local Rotarians. The funds and goods went quickly and quietly to the most needy in the most needy communities as identified by the local Rotary clubs of Haiti, in partnership with the Red Cross, government officials, local NGOs and community leaders."

Shelter Boxes used in Haiti



PDG Dick McCombe recounts how Rotary's

Shelter Boxes were distributed to providing housing for the displaced residents of villages in Haiti that were wiped out by the hurricanes and flooding.

"We went first to Cararet and saw the Shelter Boxes set up. This was a very rewarding sight. I had been in contact from the start of the initiative, and to see it go from sourcing through our fellow Rotarians, to shipping 224 units from the supply stockpile in Panama by charter to Port au Prince."

He comments on the amazing access and efficiency: "Through a Rotarian, Shelter Box Rotarian representatives and team were called on the phone and told the charter flight was on final approach into the airport, and to go to customs and meet the goods. They did so, and through our Task Force Team and our Disaster Chair Claude, they were cleared immediately. They then went on to distribution and set up. To see the completed initiative was great."

Financially Speaking

Making it all work

As we said in this column last week, a budget is an important tool for a club board, assuring that the club has the funds necessary to accomplish its essential functions, as well as be able to meet needs through its

service projects.

One question that has been raised is how we can propose a new community service project, when we noted last week that the **Club Operating Expenses** were projected to exceed the budgeted income by over \$3,000. The answer is that we are talking about apples and oranges. We do have budgeted club service funds that have been raised, and will be raised this year. As we noted, those **Service funds** cannot legally or ethically be used to cover our club's shortfall in its Operating expenses.

However, those budgeted **Service funds** can be used for service projects like the one proposed, and they have not all been allocated. The club board has chosen to bring its recommendation to the club, and ask the members to approve, or disapprove, this use of some of these Service funds.
