WeekEND Hunger Backpack Project

It's our day to serve again!

Dana Rice and Ed Marin are our club members scheduled to serve this Saturday morning at 8:00 at Mt. View Elementary, Room 805, helping with the process of loading the backpacks with the kid-friendly food items.

There is some pretty exciting news! We knew that this program was desperately needed at both the Coyote Canyon and Desert Valley Schools. Our club tackled, with the help of a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant, the challenge of at least launching the program at Coyote Canyon this year, where we had projected 35 students as weekly participants in the program. We were really disappointed we could not do both schools, but we didn't have enough money.

Bernadette Pires , local director of *Communities In Schools*, our partner organization, reports that we don't have quite as many students in the program yet at Coyote Canyon as we had expected. Consequently, with the help of some additional funding she has been able to secure, our organizations have together been able to expand the benefits of this backpack food program this year to include the older siblings from these needy families who are attending Desert Valley.

Our club has the responsibility of helping to fill the backpacks on

an every-other-Saturday schedule. Mountain View Elementary, which is totally sold on the value of this program, has provided a large room for our use in storing the food items that are purchased in huge quantities at discounted prices. Room 805 is conveniently located adjacent to the back parking lot at the school.

Tables are set up in that room in a U-shape, and we, along with other volunteers, move around the course, filling and tying plastic grocery bags with the food items that will go into each backpack. The filled bags are then transported to the participating schools, where their contents are transferred to the students' backpacks to take home each weekend.

Sharon and I served as our club's representatives, participating in this impressive and efficient process of filling the bags, on Sept. 6. Depending on the number of volunteers each day, we found that it took our group less than an hour-and-a-half to accomplish the project.
