

## 2015 BULLpen awards

# Members cited for outstanding performance in weekly quiz

The first annual awards to "members demonstrating exceptional memory and knowledge" in responding to the weekly fund-raising quiz, are being presented this holiday season by the BULLpen staff.

The search for pointless information serves as the basis for fines which raise about \$75 each week for the club's service projects.

The 2015 BULLpen Awards will be presented in four categories...Sports, History, Science, and Outstanding Overall Performance. In addition, a special Editor's Award (the Rotary Reticence Award) will go to a Rotarian who quietly demonstrates knowledge but does not yell out answers.

### The 1915 BULLpen Award Winners

HISTORY: Richard Smith cited for his demonstrated awareness of US and International events and his exhaustive, and exhausting, concern for local history which led to the town's celebration of its 350th anniversary.

**SPORTS: Alan Cohn** for his compulsive dedication to knowledge about New York Yankee players and performance. Recognition also goes to Howard Essenfeld for his broader concern and awareness of the record of other New York teams and players.

SCIENCE: Stan Haymes for his knowledge of medicine and other scientific disciplines (although the Committee acknowledges that it can not recall a single medical question ever being asked in the half-century-plus year history of the club).

**OUTSTANDING OVERALL PERFORMANCE:** The Grand Prize for knowledge in all areas goes to **Mike Walsh** who honed his skills while serving as Superintendent of Schools in Smithtown. Michael wisely spent that time closeted in his office, escaping interaction with his administrative staff, teachers, and students, while memorizing a load of generally useless information.

**ROTARY RETICENCE:** The Special Award for combining knowledge with self-control, the ability of not yelling answers out of turn, goes to **Bob Jacatout**. Bob can be found murmuring the correct answers while louder voices get greater recognition. The Committee in making the decision, acknowledges that no other nominees could be found for the award.
