We were founded in 1994 and our approximately 80 members meet weekly for breakfast, a program, and fellowship at Buffalo Hill Golf Club in Kalispell from 6:45-8:00 every Thursday. We sponsor youth exchange students, award grants to local non-profits, provide scholarships, and organize and participate in dozens of service projects annually. We collaborate with other Rotary Clubs in the Flathead to do service projects, and put on annual events such as our summer brew fest.

We belong to **Rotary District 5390** which is 40 clubs strong and covers the entire state of Montana. Our district meets twice yearly for district assembly and district conference, and there are many smaller groups of clubs who come together for projects, in coalitions, and for events.

Rotary International is a world-wide organization of over 1.2 million people who have the unique opportunity to engage in fellowship, exchange ideas and take action in our local and global community.

Avenues of Service

<u>Community Service</u> encourages every Rotarian to find ways to improve the quality of life for people in their communities and to serve the public interest.

<u>International Service</u> exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding. We support this service avenue by sponsoring or volunteering on international projects, seeking partners abroad, and more

<u>Youth Service</u> recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professionals through leadership development programs such as Rotaract, Interact, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, and Rotary Youth Exchange.

The Rotary Four Way Test

The Four-Way Test is a nonpartisan and nonsectarian ethical guide for Rotarians to use for their personal and professional relationships. The test has been translated into more than 100 languages, and Rotarians recite it at club meetings:

Of the things we think, say or do

Is it the TRUTH?

Is it FAIR to all concerned?

Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?

Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?
