

Last Week's Program SO MUCH LOVE FOR PEOPLE

If you thought Bethany Christian Services just handled adoptions, today's presenters, **Meredith Smillie** and Karly Raklovits educated us as to just how much more they do. A global faith-based nonprofit organization with over 100 offices in 36 states plus other countries, BCS does still do adoptions (domestic, international and foster care) but the agency also provides family support ...

services, foster care and community engagement assistance. Bringing and keeping families together is at the core of what they do and they do it very well. Approximately 46,000 families benefited from their care and love in 2017. BCS values and protects children, the most innately vulnerable members of the human race.

In addition to providing adoption assistance, they accomplish their mission by providing pregnancy counseling, family assistance and post adoption resources. Foster care is provided both regionally as well as the transitional foster care needed for children of refugees. Children of refugees are referred to BCS from DHHS and placed in caring foster homes, assessed to be sure their needs are being met and they are thriving developmentally plus they are given access to Skype so they can communicate with their parents on a daily basis until they are reunited, typically within 4 - 6 weeks. Closer to home, over 300 children are in foster care in Muskegon County at any given time. There is a huge need for foster care for sibling groups and for children age 7 and up. A child who is almost 18 still needs family and love and guidance and that need will not disappear just because they reach their 18th birthday. People who want to help in other ways besides adopting or becoming foster parents can still positively affect a child's life and wellbeing. Mentoring, respite time, prayer/ conversation and ministry are

just some of the ways to support families and children.

BCS has made a documentary about three families and their journey, "The Light in Their Eyes" and venues are being sought to screen this film. BCS will staff the event, but locations are needed, be they churches or

homes or anywhere people gather. After 17 years with BCS, what Meredith sees is the continued need. She would love to be out of a job because every child has what they need, but until then, the community is fortunate she and her colleagues are there giving families the benefit of their experience and compassion.

To tie up the gathering, newly minted president **Kathy Moore** shook things up by moving the Four Way Test to the end of the meeting, sending us off with a reminder of the things we believe and an added sense of community as we proceeded with our days.
